Bona fide - (Lat.), literally, in good faith; without deceit; genuine. UXBRIDGE - What constitutes a "bona

fide" farmer?

The matter was debated to some length and intensity at a meeting of township planning board, last week, when part-time farmer, Fred Wilkinson, of Goodwood, applied for a severance on his 24-acre parcel of land so that his daughter and son-in-law could build a home there.

Wilkinson, who just recently bought the property on Lot 36, Concession 7, said he worked in Markham, and farmed part time. He said he grew strawberries and raspberries and wanted to "get into pigs."

His daughter would work there full time, tending the fruit and the greenhouse. Planner Alex Grant said that, in order to sever one lot, the owner must be a "bona

fide" farmer. Asked for a definition of the latter by Councillor Ian Morrison, board chairman,

Sandy Ewen, said it applied to one who had established himself as a farmer. Said Wilkinson: "I just bought it a month

ago, but it has been operating that way for . 50 years." "You must establish yourself as a bona

fide farmer," said Councillor Ewen. "I operated in Uxbridge for five years."

"But, I am established, " said Wilkinson.

He said "it would be lucky if there were half a dozen farming in Uxbridge."

Planner Grant agreed, saying that numerous lots had been created in farm areas. An owner could build, but not sever,

he said. Wilkinson's daughter, who accompanied him to the meeting, but who would not give her name to the press, wondered how her father could "establish himself if he can't farm now."

"That's why I bought the land," Wilkinson said. "I've been farming in Goodwood for 12 years (part-time)." His son-in-law would work on the farm on the week-ends, he said.

"Regardless of whether you get this, will you continue to farm?" asked Councillor

Ian Morrison.

Wilkinson said he would, and Morrison moved that the board not support the motion to sever. "You don't seem to be helping farmers,"

Wilkinson's daughter said.

"He hasn't established himself," Councillor Ewen replied. "The land's established itself," said Wil-

kinson. There are strawberries growing-... Are you telling me to let them rot? Do you want me to let pigs starve?" Chairman Ewen said the board was deal-

ing with him as a "bona fide farmer, not the farm.'

"Is it so bad for his family to help him," the applicant's daughter asked. . The application was rejected.
