

Local ladies make clean sweep

Last Wednesday, Stouffville stunned Markham 12-5, then came back Sunday to win 10-7 and take the series.

In the second game, a bases-loaded triple by Barb Lee in the bottom of the

seventh inning broke a 7-7 deadlock, and gave Stouffville the series.

Markham had opened the scoring with two runs in the first inning. After a scoreless second inning Stouffville fought back with seven runs in the bottom of the third.

The Markham squad added three runs in the fourth and two runs in the seventh to tie the score. In the bottom of that inning,

Anne Oldham, Minnie Bell and Bev Reesor each singled to load the bases and set the stage for Barb Lee's game winning triple.

In the first game, Markham opened the scoring with a single run in the first inning. The Betz team added two in the second inning, while Markham added a single run. A run in the third inning and two more tallies in the fourth gave Stouffville a 5-2 lead.

From there Stouffville never looked back, adding four runs in the fifth inning to clinch the win. The final score was 12-5.

Big hitters for Stouffville were Anne Oldham, Jose Sage, Marcia Wagg and Sue McEwen.

Faber injured

Betz squad takes provincial crown

UNIONVILLE — A five-run seventh inning was enough to give Stouffville's Betz Pools a 12-7 triumph over Unionville and the Ontario Amateur Slo-pitch Association (OASA) D Division championship last weekend.

Stouffville, the only unbeaten squad in the 28-team tournament, started off slowly by giving up three Unionville runs in the first inning.

The count was evened after two innings as Paul Parson singled and scored, and Doug Feasby came home on Gary Grant's home run.

Unionville scored twice in the third, but Stouffville managed to take over the lead with a three-run blast by Brad Steel. Malcolm's home run in the fifth frame

gave the club a 7-5 advantage, but the opposition pounded out four hits and scored twice in the sixth to knot the count.

Stouffville replied with six hits and five runs in the final frame to put the contest out of reach. Malcolm, Feasby, Cliff Lumley, Dan Wendorf and Doug Todd did the scoring.

"The team was excellent," said Manager Marvin Betz.

He admitted the final contest was the toughest, noting, "I was nervous, but I felt very confident we'd win. We had been playing well all weekend."

He added that even if his club had lost the outing, it could have still taken the crown. Unionville, having lost one game before, would

have had to beat undefeated Stouffville twice to win.

The only cloud shadowing the tournament win was an injury to Dan Faber in the sixth inning, when he collided with a teammate while chasing a pop fly.

"They were both calling for it and they ran into each other," explained Betz. "I don't think either one heard the other."

Faber was knocked unconscious and taken to York Central Hospital in Richmond Hill by ambulance, where he was released 24 hours later.

"Dan does have a concussion, but he's going to be alright," said Betz. "He's a lucky boy."

Stouffville opened the tournament with a 14-6 shellacking of McKenzie Trailers.

Conner paced a five-run first inning with a home run. Others to cross the plate

were Parsons, Wendorf, Malcolm and Steel.

Malcolm, Wendorf and Parsons scored again in the second, while Conner and Faber upped the lead to 10-0 by the third frame. Gary Grant, Doug Feasby and Betz scored in the fourth inning and Steel completed the offence in the fifth.

The club's next outing saw it hand Markham a 3-2 loss. The crucial runs came in the fifth inning when Wendorf and Malcolm crossed the plate. Wendorf scored the other run in the third frame.

The Fogcutters were the next to fall, dropping a 5-1 decision to Stouffville. Feasby, Grant, Conner (on a home run), Wendorf and Malcolm (on a homer) provided the offence.

Stouffville pounded out 23 hits on route to a 9-3 triumph in game three. Steel led the offence with a pair of round-trippers.

STOUFFVILLE — Joe Randolph of Jo-Lynn Farms, Stouffville, has good reason to feel pleased with his 'Star', a striking three-year-old grey quarterhorse mare. Her full name is Study-a-Star and she has an enviable bloodline that includes two world champions, Physical Ed and Physical Damian, both sired by Study Hall.

At this year's CNE Quarter horse show, Star showed the versatility of the quarterhorse breed; winning firsts in both Amateur and Open English classes and placing second in the Amateur Western Pleasure, and Junior Western Classes for 4 yrs and under.

Star's potential is as yet barely tapped, although as

owner Joe Randolph points out she is just a three-year-old. Future plans include entering in several events at Picov's Horsman Centre in Pickering in the English, Western, Reining, and Breeders Futurity, followed by the Stock Horse Futurity in Ottawa.

Star is also headed for entry in three of North America's largest Quarterhorse shows; The Congress in Columbus Ohio, The World Show at Oklahoma City and Toronto's Quarterama.

Owner Randolph, who moved from Queensgate Farms on Leslie St just four months ago, will be holding both English and Western shows at Jo-Lynn Farms next season.

UXBRIDGE — In what could only be described as a "heartbreaker" for the local squad, the Stouffville Clyppers bowed out of the Uxbridge Black Hawk Oldtimers tournament over the weekend with a 2-1 loss at the hands Uxbridge Islanders.

Stouffville Clyppers opened the tournament with an impressive 8-1 victory over East Gwillimbury. Gord Ness scored three goals to spark the win, with single Stouffville tallies going to Joe Infurnari, Bill Corner, Grant Larmer, Bob McKinnon and Bob McNeil.
