Ball tourney finalists

Of the sixteen teams entered in the Uxbridge mens' slowpitch tournament on Saturday, only one of four Stouffville teams got into the money.

The double knock-out tourney saw Stouffville represented by the Blazers, Raiders, Trappers and Kerry Industries; Kerry going the hard route, having to come in the back door for a spot in the final after losing 4-2 in their opening game against Woodbridge.

Other local teams went out early: The Blazers lost two straight; the Trappers were also out in three. The Raiders lost their opener 5-0 but came back with a 14-6 win over Pickering in the second game, before losing 6-4 against the same team and suffer eliminated.

Kerry's massive comeback effort was rewarded after

a six game marathon that saw them knock-off Woodbridge in game four, slide by the Gorgons in the quarter final before disposing of Gouley Fuels 2-1 in the semi-finals.

Having almost played themselves to a standstill Kerry showed their mettle by downing Goodwood-Uxbridge Auto Wreckers 7-5 in their two-game final, a stupendous effort that saw Alonzo Richards and Steve Skinner both fire homers, Richards homer being the key to the win.

Despite a grand slam in the opening innings of the final, Kerry were unable to keep up the pace. Their previous seven-game winning streak had taken its toll and they eventually bowed out 9-7; but not before picking up the runner's-up cheque for \$300.
