


Like magic---it fits!



Huge Stouffville water reservoir slides up cement shaft

STOUFFVILLE — "We've had a long way to go in bringing the Christian community together, but it helped". This was the feeling expressed by Rev. Philip Poole at the conclusion of a weekend preaching and teaching mission here, conducted by Marney Patterson and his "Invitation To Live" team.

Rev. Poole was the crusade chairman. He said the fact

many people had made a decision with respect to their faith, was exciting. On this basis alone, he said, the campaign was "very successful".

The Anglican pastor admitted disappointment with attendance, Friday and Saturday. He said, however, that the congregation of close to 400, Sunday, was encouraging. The women's luncheon was attended by 100 and the men's breakfast hosted

close to eighty. He described the "coffee clusters" as "excellent".

Rev. Poole praised the messages delivered by Rev. Patterson and the ministry in music by soloist Jean Marshall and the ecumenical choir.

The total offering amounted to just over \$1,400, all of which will be used to subsidize the team's work in The Third World.
