To-night, we give you a somewhat different offering. Located between Farmer Jack's and Girrard Carpets, we visit the Stouffville Deli Restaurant. Warm summer days will find many patrons outside,

enjoying the flower-encompassed patio. Inside, the atmosphere is pleasant and very European with a smashing delicatessen. The only drawback to any individual like myself

with, as you might have guessed, a rather wide girth, are the narrow table and bench-style seats which offer very little breathing room. Dress here, is casual and the service is accompanied with a smile. Lately, the chef has been specializing in game dishes. Having appreciated the luncheons here before, we are

not disappointed to-night. Cathryn wasn't quite "game" for the game dishes, opting for the corn beef on rye, a very generous serving, side-dressed with perfect french fries and creative greens such as lettuce, coleslaw, grated carots, pickles, tomatoes, cucumber and a slice of orange!

My buffalo steak is not only scrumptious and tonguetingling but makes me appreciate the fact that good food can still be offered at reasonable prices. To-night, the clientelle is a mixture of family and business diners. Here, a fine children's menu is also offered.

Accompanying the meal, we each have a glass of wine. The restaurant, at present, has a beer and wine licence. Cathryn enjoys a delicious piece of home-made apple pie. I, once again, elect for my favorite-black forest cake and I'm not disappointed. It is rich and fresh.
