 After nine years as pastor at St. James Presbyterian Church, and with a deep involvement in activities of the community, Rev. Ted Green, in the words of ministerial cohort, Rev. Philip Poole, "is committing the unforgivable sin". He's leaving Stouffville to form part of a team ministry at St. Andrew's, Owen Sound.

Rev. Green, accompanied by wife Lorraine and daughter, Sarah, was honored at a community farewell, Sunday afternoon, in Christ Anglican Church, Sunset Boulevard.

Rev. Poole told of Mr. Green's participation in town activities including The Ministerial Association, The Family Life Centre, Home Support Services, The Parkview (Ninth Line South) Project, The Concerned Citizens' Committee plus duties related to his own church and congregation.

Rev. Poole mentioned Ted's love of music and how he used this talent for the writing of hymns, songs and cantatas, several for children.

"Ted has meant much to Stouffville," he said, "he'll be greatly missed".

Rev. Craig Pitts, chairman of the Stouffville Ministerial, described Rev. Green as "a man who cares—a very down-to-earth, approachable kind of guy".

The Pentecostal

pastor added a touch of humor to his address when he told how the Ministerial wished to present their departing Brother with a cheque but couldn't because Rev. Green's the Association's treasurer.

Mayor Eldred King presented the guest of honor with an engraved Town Crest. He described the pastor as "a witness in our midst".

He told of receiving letters from time to time, but declined to reveal their content. He praised his assistance during the controversial "water issue", stat-

ing with a smile, "I sometimes wondered if he might drown himself".

Mayor King said he first met Rev. Green during the summer exchange of pastors, over eight years ago. He said he marvelled at the ability of someone so small on size, to do so many things—deliver the sermon, play the guitar, sing in the choir and talk to the children.

Late Walter Davis Loved music

STOUFFVILLE — Walter Davis, one of the few surviving members of the original Claremont Citizens' Band, passed away Nov. 29 in Riverdale Hospital, Toronto where he'd been a patient four months.

Mr. Davis, 92, was first admitted to Scarborough Centenary Hospital for treatment of a bleeding ulcer. While there, he suffered a stroke, necessitating the move to Riverdale.

Walter Davis was born Sept. 28, 1891 in the Twp. of Uxbridge, the son of Jesse and Elizabeth (Pickering) Davis. An excellent farmer, he operated the 'home' property until his retirement to Altona. Later, following acquisition of this residence by the federal government, he moved to Park Drive North in Stouffville. Prior to admission to Centenary Hospital, he lived at Parkview Home.

Mr. Davis was a man of many talents. His wood-working skills were always visible on his lawn at Park Drive where ornaments of all sizes and descriptions attracted much attention. But most of all, he was an excellent musician, from the days when he sang in choirs at the Free Methodist and United Missionary Churches to playing the slide trombone in the Stouffville and Claremont Bands. Various engagements took him many miles around the

country. He was also accomplished on the violin, playing for others' enjoyment as well as his own. Dozens of songs on tape remain a testimonial to his skill.

Walter Davis was a good living man with strong Christian convictions. When infirmity made it difficult to attend services regularly, he would worship via the People's Church broadcasts on television.

Walter Davis will be remembered for his sense of humor. He loved sharing jokes with his close friends, either in the quiet of his own home or on a street-corner in town. He was a familiar figure in Stouffville, riding his versatile three-wheeler to and from the Post Office.

Surviving besides his wife, is one daughter, Effie (Susie), Mrs. George Fairbanks of Avondale Crescent, Markham; one son, Morley of R.R. 1, Claremont; one sister, Gladys (Mrs. Herb Farrier), Montreal Street, Stouffville; nine grandchildren and several great-grandchildren. He was predeceased by a daughter, Myrtle Norman.

As was his wish, Rev. Donald Pugh of Plattsville, Ont., and formerly of Altona Missionary Church, conducted the service, Friday, from the O'Neill Funeral Chapel with interment, Stouffville Cemetery.

1. Stop up and close that part of the road allowance between Concession 9 and Concession 10 located in front of Part of Lot 13, Concession 10 in the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville in the Regional Municipality of York, more particularly described as Parts 2, 3 and 5.
 2. Authorize the sale of that part of the stopped up and closed road allowance to the owners of the land abutting same.
 3. To accept a conveyance of Parts 7, 8 and 9 and to subsequently reconvey Parts 7 and 8 to the owners of the land abutting same when and if necessary.
 4. To dedicate Parts 4 and 9 for use as a public highway if and when necessary.
 5. To dedicate Parts 1 and 6 to The Regional Municipality of Durham for use as part of the public highway designated as Durham Regional Road Number 30 if and when necessary to do so.
