**Cookbook useful for all**

Fancy meals don't necessarily require a great amount of time, money or effort to prepare, says Deborah Shearer of Unionville. Ms. Shearer has proven that point with her recently-published cookbook, "Undercover Gourmet."

"The book takes the mystery out of gourmet-style cooking," said Ms. Shearer. "A lot of the recipes taste like fancy food, but I use simple things to recreate the taste."

The author employs spices and liquors for many of the recipes, which are all her own. The book includes recipes for hors d'oeuvres, wok meals, dinners, and brunch, and also ideas for fruit desserts, and vegetables.

Concoctions described include Fruity Stuffed Chicken, Soya'd Beans and Mushies, Wok Your Fiddle, and Tender Turkey.

Ms. Shearer has taken a light approach with the cookbook, and the recipes are hand written in a conversational style. The book is illustrated by Dan Olsen of York University's Fine Arts department.

The author stresses that the cookbook is practical for almost anyone.

"It's good for those who like to cook, but don't have the time, and for those who never cook, but would like to make gourmet-style food," she said.

For Ms. Shearer, the book is the product of both her cooking and writing skills. A Journalism graduate from Ryerson Polytechnical Institute, she formerly wrote and produced television commercials at CKVR in Barrie, and CITY and

HUCHM Productions in Toronto for seven years altogether.

The cookbook, which costs \$7.95, is available at the Kitchen Witch, on Main St., Unionville (Ms. Shearer will be signing books there this Sunday between 2 and 4 p.m.), and Green Gables Books, on Main St., Markham.

The book is being distributed in southern Ontario, Ottawa, Calgary and Halifax. A total of 1,000 copies have been made so far, and a second printing is planned.

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**BIA issues new calendar, with historical slant**

The Old Markham Village 1984 Calendar, now available, and local history buffs will be pleased.

The calendar, produced by the Markham BIA (Business Improvement Area) Association, contains old photographs from the Markham Museum and ex-

cerpts from the 1884 editions of the Markham Economist.

On Jan. 10, 1884, for instance, the people of Markham experienced "the heaviest fall of snow in years"—an average of more than two feet—and Economist readers were warned that "Travelling can

now only be done under difficulties."

The difficulties were too much for some, it seems. On Jan. 17, 1884, readers were informed that "James Speight Esq., Managing Director of the Wagon Works, and his daughter Miss Martha, have gone to Pensacola.

By March, 1884, residents must have been relieved to read "The snow is nearly gone, and the danger from spring freshets is about over."

Interesting tidbits are sprinkled throughout the calendar accompanied by an old photo for each month. January starts off with an aerial shot of a barely-recognizable Markham, circa 1917.

Other photos include the Maple Leaf Woolen Mill destroyed by fire in 1917, Gower's Blacksmith Shop on Main St., the Grand Trunk Railway Station, Franklin St. Public School, and a group of determined-looking musicians in the Markham Village Brass Band, circa 1900.

The style of the calendar is based on last year's design, and the cost is last year's price of \$3.

Proceeds are going to the Markham Stouffville Hospital Building Fund.

A drawing of one of Markham's gazebo bus shelters is featured on the cover of the Old Markham Village 1984 Calendar, produced by members of the Business Improvement Area.

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
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
