The first period was scoreless with both goaltenders making excellent stops. Late in the second, Dan Larmer blinked the light, giving Stouffville a 1-0 lead.


Before the start of the

In a last-ditch effort to "break the ice", the Hillcrest coach pulled his


netminder. However, the move backfired when Darron Baston hit the target with a wellaimed shot.
