

# Credit Union Peewees capture title

Stouffville's Credit Union Peewees, captured the 'A' Division Grand Championship in Haliburton on the weekend, defeating Hillcrest, a strong MTHL 'A-A' club 3-0 in the tournament's final game.

In their first encounter, Friday, Stouffville

skated to a 6-1 victory over Ottawa.

Six players shared in the scoring—Kevin Blacktopp, Dan Larmer, Darron Baston, Kevin Francis, Craig Stronach and Ted Stonehouse.

On Saturday, the Credit Union kids faced Hillcrest for a first time and lost 5-3. They spotted

their rivals a 3-0 lead, then fought back and scored two. Tonio Trentadue fired one and Dan Larmer counted the other on a penalty shot. Stouffville's third tally came from the stick of Darron Baston.

This put the Clippers into the 'A' Division Consolation Championship

against Ottawa. It was no contest. Stouffville shut out their opponents 6-0. Two-goal marksmen were Craig Stronach, Tonio Trentadue and Darron Baston. Scott Evans and Basil Luciano worked between the pipes and shared the shutout.

The win against Ottawa set the stage for a showdown contest against Hillcrest.

The first period was scoreless with both goaltenders making excellent stops. Late in the second, Dan Larmer blinked the light, giving Stouffville a 1-0 lead.

Before the start of the final frame, Coach Grant Nesbitt gathered his troops together for a heart-to-heart talk. It worked. Within 57 seconds, Dan Larmer counted his second of the contest.

In a last-ditch effort to "break the ice", the Hillcrest coach pulled his

netminder. However, the move backfired when Darron Baston hit the target with a well-aimed shot.

Brad MacDonald was selected the 'A' Division's best defenceman. Scott Evans was similarly recognized as the top goaltender.

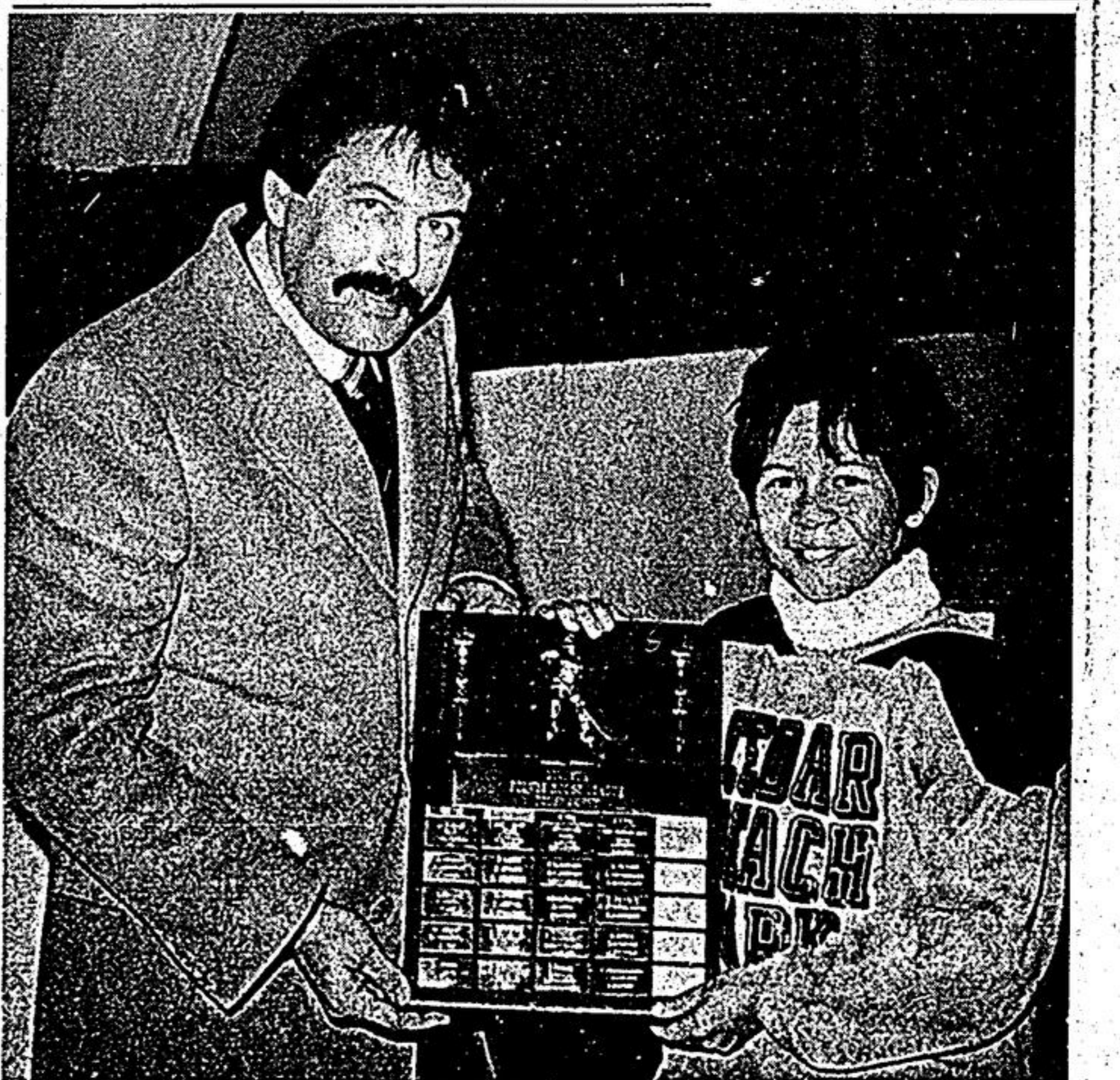
## Bantams split pair
