One of the buildings on the Museum grounds will be made available so skaters can "warm up" should the weather be unusually cold.

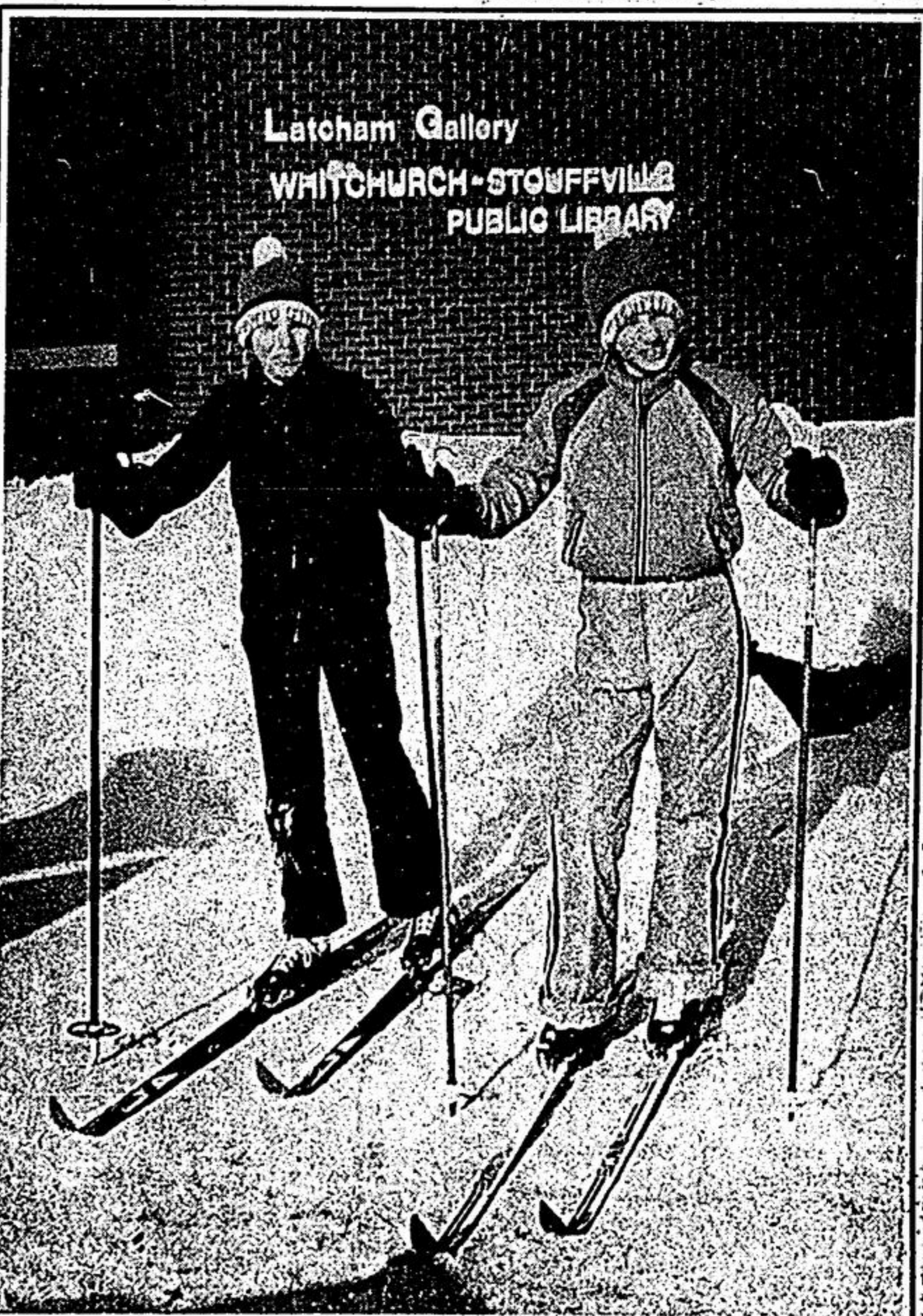
Music for skating will be provided and refreshments will be served.
