Goaltenders pick up 3 MVP awards

Bantams emerge champs at Schomberg tournament

The Edwards-Murphy Bantam Clippers put it all together on Sunday when they won the seventh annual Red and White tournament at Schomberg.

Collecting his first goal of the season, defenseman Derek Hutchinson's marker proved the winner as the Clippers defeated a very strong Barrie Club 2-0.

Hutchinson's picture goal, that had the Barrie goaltender beaten fair and square, came in the second period from just inside the blue line. Sean McQuigge picked up the assist. The insurance marker was an unassisted effort by Jeff Christensen midway in the third period.

Super-goaltending by Stouffville's John Bellerby earned him the game's MVP award. He also received the tournament's Best Goaltender award.

Also in the individual awards list was Jim Todd, the Clippers' other goalie. Jim received a MVP award for his performance in a previous tourney game; only netminders gave up only one goal in three games.

In other action this past week, the Bantam Clippers brought their league record up to 5-0 with a convincing 5-1 win over Pickering Village, giving them a 8-3 record on the season.

Clipper marksmen were McQuigge, (2), Christensen (2) and Chris Tyman. Ex-Clipper Tim Evans, who now plays for Uxbridge, again proved the Clipper's nemesis when they met Uxbridge on Friday night in exhibition play. Evans gave Uxbridge the winning goal with only 38 seconds left in the game, putting the Clippers at the wrong end of a 7-6 score; not the first time he has done it.

Junior coach still hopeful

Two successive losses last week by the A & S Construction Clippers; the first a 6-1 beating by Uxbridge, the second a horror story that had Lindsay humiliate the Clippers 23-1, have not diminished coach Jack Watson's hopes of a win against Uxbridge this weekend.

On the contrary, despite the team's poor record this season, their one point lead over the Uxbridge Bruins could possibly be extended to three, but only if they beat Uxbridge on their own ice on Friday; but it won't be an easy win.

The game is crucial to both teams as neither have much hopes of collecting points in the few remaining games left to them.

The loss of the 'borrowed help' from the Midget squad was the main factor in their humiliation by Lindsay last Friday. The Midgets were out-of-town in tournament play and needed every man they could muster.

Watson is high in his praise for some of his players. "This has been a character building year for quite a number of them, and you can't knock them for not trying," he said.

Chris Baggs performance against Lindsay was remarkable. "Pure guts and determination," was how Watson described the young defenseman. Also high on his personal list of 'best sellers' is team captain Jamie Bell. "Bell has tried hard all year and given it his best," he said.

Other players who come in for praise are Mike Anderson, described by Watson as a "three period player," also Chris Brown, Chris Freckleton. Freckleton hasn't missed a game or practice all season - and Bob Whitesides.

Asked if he thought the Junior 'C' Clippers had run their lot, Watson swiftly rejected the idea of dropping the team. "Give it another year and you'll have plenty to choose from. The Midgets have a lot of class and, combined with some of the younger players on the junior squad, could make a fine junior team," he opined.

Limbering up in readiness for the playoffs, the Credit Union Peeewe Clippers gave good competition to a couple of AA rated teams this last week. In three games they managed a win, a tie and a loss.

Skating to a 1-1 tie against Richmond Hill's top team on Saturday, the Clippers trailed 1-0 on an early goal by their opponents. It was late in the third when Dan Larmer fed a goalmouth pass to Kevin Francis, who tied the knot with 30 seconds left to play.

The game produced good, fast, exciting hockey.

The previous evening the Clippers emerged 5-4 winners after a hard battle against Pickering Hockey Association. The scoring was well spread out with singles going to Craig Stronach, Kevin Blacktopp, Dan Larmer, Kevin Francis and Darron Baston.

The Clippers only loss was on Jan. 17 when they were edged 5-4 by Bay Ridges' top squad.

Point getters were: Kevin Blacktopp with a goal and two assists, Dan Larmer and Jamie Campbell with a goal and an assist each, while Tonio Trentadue added a single and two assists.

Despite a long layoff the Peeewe Selects put out a strong team effort against Unionville at Crosby arena on Sunday, holding their hosts to a 3-3 tie. Particularly outstanding were goaltenders Scott Wagg and Dan Bell who shared net duties in this one.

Whether you agree or disagree with the statement matters not. But to phone in and say that the praise was too lavish, or that your team was better, presents a meanness of attitude that I find rather tacky, Latham Gallery.

The artist has captured light and shadow in a way that few artists rarely do.

For all those hockey players who have complained that they can't see the playoff circle and lines on the arena ice surface, dont fret. Joe Lewis says they will be repainted before the playoffs start. Must admit though, they are rapidly disappearing from view.

Bruins hopes run high

Despite trailing by one point in the closely contested battle for a playoff spot, Coach Wayne Redshaw of the Uxbridge Bruins has an air of confidence that could make all the difference when they host the A & S Construction Clippers this Friday.
