Church had good year

STOUFFVILLE — Membership in the congregation of Stouffville United Church totalled 232 as of Dec. 31, 1983, it was revealed in a report prepared for the annual meeting Jan. 29.

During the past year, 18 were removed by death. There were 16 weddings and 10 baptisms.

A summary of activities was prepared by various committees within the congregation including: Worship and Membership, (Chairman Lin Jones); Choir, (Beatrice Jennings); Christian Education, (Marion Hodgson); Sunday School, (Ralph Sibbick and Tyrell-Ann Williams); Explorers, (Margaret Curtis, Jean Painter, Karen Newbold); Messengers, 'Cubs and Scouts, (Bruce Richards); C.G.I.T., (Jean Barclay, Marion Hodgson, Tyrell-Ann Williams); Girl Guides, (Donna Gilbert); Couples Club, (Jim and Lovanna Sanders); United Church Women, (Marion 'Boadway'); Outreach and Community Service, (Barbara Schell); Property, (Bruce Richards); Finance, (Doug Widdifield).

Mr Widdifield, Finance Committee Chairman, reported a surplus of Jan. 1, 1984 of almost \$3,000, compared to a deficit of over \$3,400, the same date last year. He praised the work of the Special Activities Committee under the chairmanship of John Wylie. One event, a Fun Day at the Park, realized a profit in excess of \$2,800.00. A similar program is planned for 1984, Mr Widdifield said.

Rev. Cecil Tiller, in his message, said the combined reports of all committees, tell a story of "dedication and effort on the part of many people." "May 1984 be a challenging, satisfying and rewarding year as we press on toward the goal for the upward call of God in Jesus Christ," he concluded.

Late Claire Bell Business in town

STOUFFVILLE — Claire Bell, a former Stouffville resident and businessman, passed away suddenly Jan. 22 while on vacation in Florida. He was 73.

It was 1939 that Mr Bell, accompanied by his parents and sisters, came to Stouffville from Yorkton, Saskatchewan. With his father, the late Bert Bell, they opened a Cockshutt farm implement dealership, utilizing a portion of the premises on Main Street owned by the late Dick Ward. Later, they built a store of their own east of the Baptist Church. From there, they sold machinery and electrical appliances. This property was later purchased by Ed and Doug Neville, then demolished to make way for the Duffin Creek re-channelization project.

Claire Bell was a member of the Canadian Armed Forces and saw service overseas in Italy during World War II.

After leaving Stouffville, he lived for a time at Norland and then moved to Fenelon Falls.

Surviving are two sons, David Tremblay of Newmarket and Norman Tremblay of Norland; one daughter, Mary (Mrs Jim Ryans) of Fenelon Falls and one sister, Audrey, (Mrs Les Clarke) of Stouffville. He was predeceased by a sister Grace Anderson.

Service was held Jan. 26 from the Illman-Platten Funeral Home, Fenelon Falls with spring interment, Pine Grove Cemetery, Norland.
