Late Sarah Pegg Spread happiness

STOUFFVILLE — It was 14 years ago that George and Sarah Pegg came to Stouffville. During this period, both have brought joy to the lives of many, mainly through their music—George with the Whitchurch-Stouffville Concert Band and Sarah as pianist with the Silver Jubilee Club Kitchen Band.

On Feb. 14, a sad note was struck among the seniors of this community when word was received of Sarah's sudden passing. She collapsed in their Blake Street home and never recovered. She would have marked her 80th birthday next month.

Mrs Pegg, the former Sarah Lois Chesher, was born at Gall, Ont., daughter of William John and Margaret (Ellerby) Chesher. Following their marriage, she and her husband moved around quite a bit including residences at Whitevale, Markham, Blackstock, Claremont and Stouffville. For a time, they had a cottage at Udora.

Mrs Pegg took piano lessons as a girl but, in later years, played mostly by ear. Her versatility at the keyboard was amazing. The Kitchen Band thrived under her leadership, providing pleasure for audiences over a wide area. A personal enjoyment soon became a delight for hundreds. However, Sarah's attributes didn't begin and end with her musical talent. She was welcomed company at any occasion, displaying a sense of humor that won her a host of close friends. As well as the Silver Jubilee organization, she was also a member of the Stouffville Friendship Club.

Mrs Pegg was a lover of flowers and their home displayed her handiwork. She also enjoyed travelling.

When unable to attend regular Sunday worship, she would watch services from the People's Church on television.

Sarah was proud of her family, one son, Donald, R.R. 2, Claremont; three daughters, Phyllis, (Mrs Clarke Major) of Brooklin; Gladys, (Mrs Walter Brickwood), of Gravenhurst; Nola, (Mrs Harold Harper) of Sunderland; ten grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. Surviving also are two sisters, Gladys McKinnon of Toronto and Helen Wilson of Stouffville. She was predeceased by two brothers and a sister.

Service was held from the McEachnie Funeral Home, Pickering, Friday afternoon with Rev. Rob Lyon-Stewart of Whitevale in charge. Hundreds called at the chapel including those band members who remembered "the good times" of a close association. Although charitable donations were requested instead of flowers, the floral tributes were beautiful.
