Dear Jim:
I promised myself not to waste any more time on the Dump issue after Council approved the agreement last year, because it didn't seem to concern the majority of people in Whitchurch-Stouffville. However, recent developments prompt me to write and set the record straight.

Let there by no mistake, without the publicity stirred up by the Concerned Citizens, the fourteen families now enjoying piped-in Town water, would still be pumping from their wells. The hydrogeological studies would not have been started and the Company would have the blessing of the Environment Ministry to expand dumping

rather than control and stop it by June, 1985. After all, the Ministry allowed further dumping in 1976 without insisting on intensive studies.

How can Mayor King insist at this point that only the closing date of June 1985 is the important part of the agreement? A year ago, he sold the agreement to Council with the help of Fran Sainsbury, by stressing the utmost importance of the testing that would be completed by December, 1983.

However, nobody thought, at the time of the agreement, to include a penalty clause to insure the testing would be completed. Now, the testing will be concluded whenever the Company sees fit to do so.

What makes Mayor King so sure the Company will hold to the closing date?

The whole agreement isn't worth the paper it's written on and the Town, including Council, will one day regret that, any time now. Waste Management will finish off their coup

In the meantime, we have all been had by the Company and the Ministry, including Dump experts Councillor Sainsbury and Mayor King. The only reason I'm hanging in at all is the fear that, any time now, Waste Management will finish off their coup

with reapplication for expansion of the Dump.

My biggest problem is that I feel no satisfaction at all in saying "I told you so."



Reservations here are a weekend must, and be prepared to hunt for a parking space. Formal, best describes the required dress and atmosphere. For that special occasion, with subtle, smooth and sophisticated service, we heartily recommend you give this dining-out spot a try.

We begin with piping hot French onion soup, a favorite of ours. The salad that follows is fresh, not overfilling and complemented by Thousand Island dressing.

Cathryn chooses the English cut roast beef entree. Three juicy, knife-yielding pieces of scrumptious looking meat arrive, satisfying her appetite.

We accompany our meal with a semi-dry bottle of red wine.

May I suggest to lovers of shish kabob, they try the serving placed on my plate. It's mouth-watering.


Peter's is the type of place where one likes to linger over his meal. Here, relaxation comes easily.
