nine people, he said. There were three chil-dren in the Sunday School---Clifton and Carole Morris and Glen Ross Thompson. "Bill Morris," he concluded, "had a vision

Rev. Cromey spoke of the spirit of co-operation that has prevailed within the congregation of St. James. He referred to the construction of a debt-free manse "as a little miracle", a project, he said, made possible through foresight and planning. He also praised the membership for com-

pletion of a new church addition in 1983.
