While Lewis pulled the trigger on each of the Stouffville tallies, he was afforded strong help by his mates. Jason Underwood and Drae Glover drew assists on his first tally; Jeff Cowley and Glover on the second and David Carmanica on the third.

Cobour pulled within one of tying the score but couldn't lift their netminder in favor of an extra attacker due to pressure from the Stouffville forwards and defence.

At Cobourg, Friday, the homesters jumped into a two-goal lead before the visitors could

get untracked. Stouffville trailed 3-1 part-way through the second. Then they went to work, blasting five pucks into the Cobourg cage without reply from their rivals.

Drae Glover was sensational, hitting the target three times. His first came on passes

from Eilert Fraser and Jay Scaife; his second from Jason Underwood and Brandon Pridham and his third from Bill Payne and Scott Ferris.

Before and after this volley of sure-fire shots, Brandon Pridham, Brad Blacktopp and Dayle Lewis dented the twine. Jason Whitebread and

Lewis assisted on Pridham's marker. Paul Trentadue and Lewis helped out on Blacktopp's tally. Underwood and Whitebread picked up points on the Lewis goal.

Danny Wilson turned in a strong performance between the pipes for Stouffville.

Peewees perform heroics edge Gananoque in thriller

STOUFFVILLE — It's goodbye Gananoque, hello Huntsville.

The Peewee Clippers, sponsored by Stouffville Dist. Credit Union and coached by Grant Nesbitt, have advanced to the Ontario semi-finals. Future dates aren't definite but the management is trying for the series opener here Friday.

Stouffville gained their win over Gananoque the

hard way—a 4-3 victory Sunday in the fifth and final game. Dan Larmer, the hero of the game and the series, broke a 3-3 tie with a minute left in regulation time. Kevin Francis and Darron Baston drew assists.

Larmer was mobbed by his jubilant mates.

While Stouffville's prime concern now is Huntsville, the players won't soon

forget the five contests just concluded. Each was decided by a single goal with two going into overtime and one settled in the final second.

In Sunday's fixture, Stouffville built up a commanding lead on two goals by Larmer and one by Francis with assists, going to Sven Henneze and Brad MacDonald on the first; Kevin Blacktopp and Larmer on the second and Daryl Ham and MacDonald on the third.

Gananoque wasn't to be counted out, however. They roared back to even the count at 3-3.

This set the stage for Larmer's climactic tally, with Francis and Baston drawing assists.

For Larmer, the Paul Henderson in the Peewee lineup, it was his third hat-trick of the series and his third deciding tally. Stouffville won 1-0 at Gananoque, Friday after losing a heart-breaker 4-3 in overtime Wednesday.

It was Darron Baston's goal at Gananoque, Friday, that brought the two teams back to Stouffville for the 'rubber match', Sunday. Francis set up the play.

Here Wednesday, the goal-getters were Francis, Larmer and MacDonald.

Netminder Scott Evans played strongly in every game. In the 1-0 Stouffville victory at Gananoque, Friday, he was particularly outstanding.

Will pay own way if reduce ice costs

STOUFFVILLE — Although poorly attended, (only eight members of the public showed up), Thursday's meeting of the Culture and Recreation Committee was beneficial in several respects.

David Bourne, representing the Whitechurch-Stouffville Minor Hockey Association, proposed that ice-time charges, currently

\$59 an hour, be cut in half and subsidies paid by the Town be removed. The 1983 subsidy, totalling \$36,000, has risen steadily over the last few years, it was stated. Its removal would mean the Association would become completely self-supporting. It would also dispense with the onerous business of requesting financial help every year.

The lack of washroom facilities for this year's Ladies Slo-Pitch Tournament, was raised by Cliff Dunkeld. Because the Arena and Latcham Hall are booked for the Antique Show, accommodation in this regard is at a premium. It was agreed that portable toilets be used, providing they are supplied and paid for by the Town.

According to Recreation Co-ordinator Lizette Lacoursiere, user fees will be introduced for ball teams this year. An amount of \$3 per person for resident teams and \$5 per person for outsiders has been agreed upon. The various clubs have been notified.

Hire Town Staff

The question of hiring summer staff was raised by Daphne Goldman. Mrs Goldman wanted to know why the Town didn't give preference to local students. In reply, Marlene McKee-Weatherall, assistant co-ordinator, explained that qualifications for summer jobs were stringent, particularly at the Pool. "If all Town applicants had the necessary qualifications, they would be hired," she said. "Last year, we had to hire three Markham students because we couldn't find sufficiently qualified people here."

Rec. Complex Status Questions as to the status of the new Recreation Complex went unanswered because, according to Councilor Wilf Morley, "there are too many variables involved." He did, however, promise a statement as soon as all tenders have been received and the cost to the taxpayer is known.

STOUFFVILLE — A benefit game for the family of the late Bryan Clute will be played in the Stouffville Arena Sat., March 17.

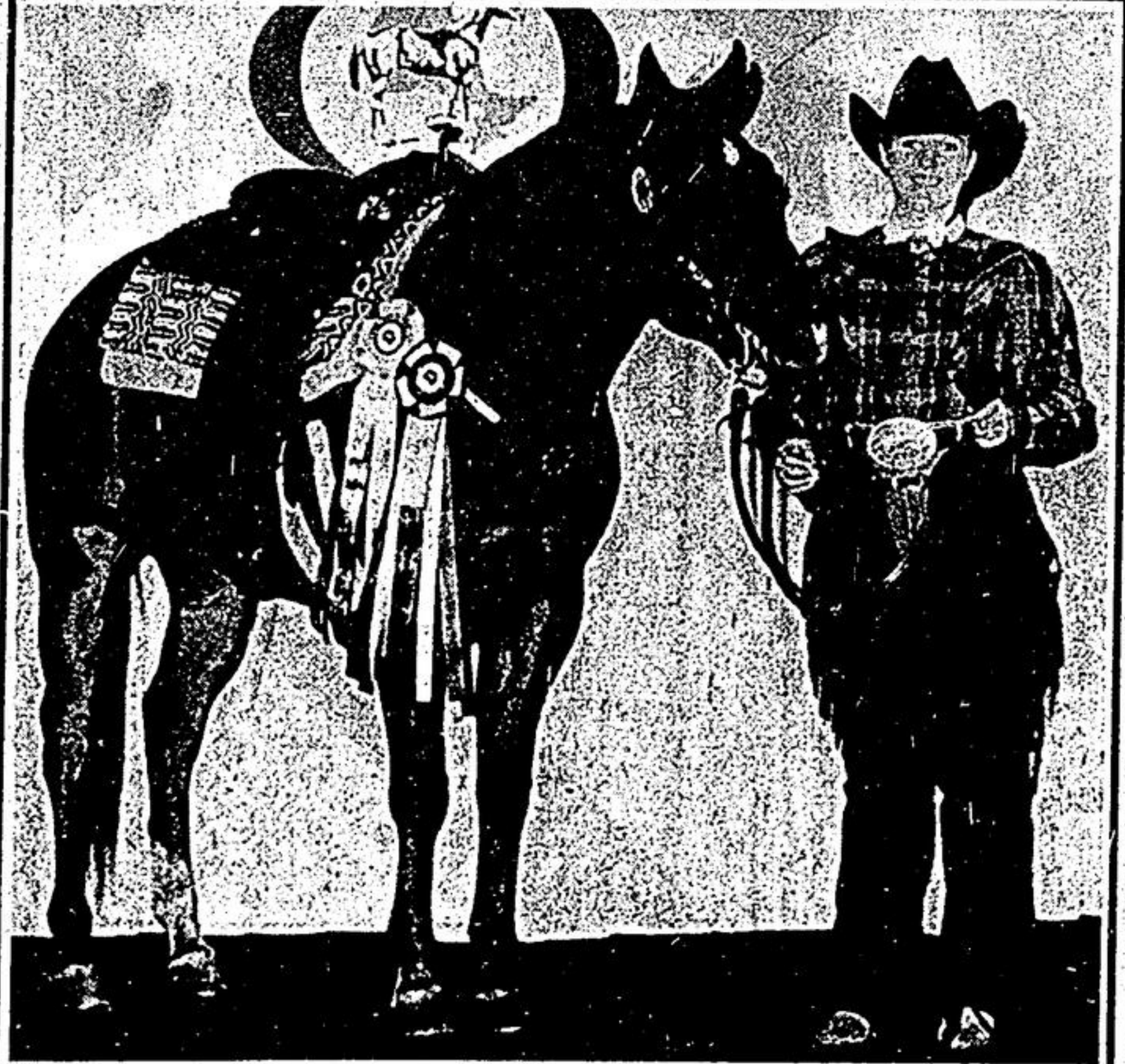
