STOUFFVILLE — John Foulds is back in town. However, it's his contention, he never really left. He and partner Paul Baker have opened a 'family' butcher shop at 17 Success Square Plaza, Main East and Stouffer Street. For the past five years he operated a similar business at Ballantrae. When John came to Stouffville from England, 29 years ago, he took charge of what was then the first self-serve meat counter here. It was located in Glen Ratcliff's store, a forerunner of the present I.G.A. That was in 1955. On the basis of anticipated growth, John opened a butcher shop at Ballantrae in 1979. But the hamlet didn't grow, at least not enough to make the venture profitable and the distance factor for Stouffville shoppers, (when the weather was bad), was too great. So now, John's bringing his business to the people. He's calling it a 're-opening'. "I always liked it here," he said, "I never really left." The Family Butcher Shop will be open Monday through Wednesday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Thursday and Friday from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m., and Saturday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

To expand

STOUFFVILLE — A planned addition to Guaranty Trust will more than double current office space. Manager Bruce Gribbon said the Main Street West building has approximately 900 square feet now. With the addition, the size will increase to nearly two thousand square feet. "We've simply outgrown the office," he said, speaking of the eight-member staff. "It's crowded now, but once the addition is completed, we'll have more than enough room." Preliminary work on the project began nearly a year ago, Mr. Gribbon explained, but it took a long time to obtain all necessary approvals. "We hope to start in mid-March and are aiming for a completion date of mid-May," he said. An official opening will be held when all work is finished, Mr. Gribbon concluded.
