**Kinsmen campaign for new Rec. Centre**

Dear Jim:  
The Kinsmen Club of Stouffville, wish to publicize two upcoming events sponsored by the membership.

The first is a sporting equipment lottery in aid of the Town Rec. Centre. Canadian Tire has donated eight prizes—a BMX bicycle, fishing equipment, a 14-club golf bag, camping equipment as well as baseball, basketball and soccer equipment.

Money raised by the event will be donated to the Rec. Centre Building Fund as part of the Kinsmen's \$5,000 commitment towards seeing this facility completed.

Hopefully, the tickets will be available early in April and this will coincide with the tendering of Phase I. We're certain this facility is needed by

our residents and are convinced the Complex can be erected for much less than the rumored figures.

It should be remembered that two years ago, (or was it three), the Master Plan reported our Town was way behind in providing recreational facilities for its citizens. Certainly, the Complex may be used by only 50 per cent of the population, maybe even less. However, it is the responsibility of the municipality, the service clubs, the provincial and the federal governments to provide facilities for those people. Up to 50 per cent of the funding will come from outside the Town, and this money you have already donated through taxes will go to some other community if we don't take it. There are three

basic reasons why the Town should invest money in the Complex:

(1). It will become an asset to the Town and will allow Council to use it as collateral for future borrowing.

(2). It will attract new development to the area and increase land sale revenues to the Town.

(3). It will increase the saleability of all homes in the area. The location of the Rec. Centre Complex, next to the High School, offers added incentive to

rent the facilities to the Board of Education during off-peak hours. The addition of playing fields, a swimming pool, exercise rooms, etc., will help upgrade the school's athletic program.

If this is not enough positive reasoning for improving recreational facilities in the area, then think about this:

The Kinsmen Club of Leamington are building a \$5.4 million recreation complex. Five hundred thousand dol-

lars of this is being raised by the Club itself and the remainder is coming via government grants.

The draw for our Rec. Centre Lottery will take place June 6, 1984. It will be held in conjunction with a Bed Race and a BMX Rally, planned for the same day. Proceeds from these events will go to the Markham Stouffville Hospital Building Fund.

Driving north on Woodbine Avenue this clear, crisp St. Patrick's Day, Cathryn and I arrive at the Longhorn Steakhouse.

The location is, to us, a veritable oasis after several miles of open countryside. The interior warmth from this chilly evening is welcome.

The setting here is best described as open-space, Spanish style. Seating is comfortable and a large lounge with a glowing hearth awaits those who wish only a cocktail and quiet conversation. A colorful fresh salad is served but the lettuce is thickly sliced, requiring use of a knife to make it bite size.

My entree of shish-ka-bob comprises large tender chunks of beef, well-spiced and perfectly cooked. The requested bed of rice is baseball in size and should have been omitted.

Cathryn enjoys her fillet of sole. She describes the baby carrots, covered with orange sauce, as innovative and tasty.

When dining here, I suggest the creme de menthe parfalt as an excellent finish to any meal. We find it very rich and refreshing. The service at the Longhorn is efficient and attentive.

Tonight, the Longhorn offers some very mood-setting dinner music by "The Taylor Brothers" trio.

Following our filling dinner and several dances to the accompaniment of this fine group, we say goodnight.

Ah, but this is St. Patrick's, and with Thomas Corrigan O'Neill as a grand-father, I feel the celebrations must continue. Cathryn and I return to another favorite spot, the Monte Cristo in Stouffville. Here, we listen to, dance to and sing along with some wonderful Irish ballads, lead by my old friend and wonderful entertainer, Bob Davies. Those of you who haven't yet had the pleasure of enjoying Bob's show, should make an effort to attend.
