STOUFFVILLE — Jim Fletcher or "Fletch" as he's known to a wide circle of friends (and some senior students), is leaving the staff at Summitview School.

He's not going far but any other school is too far for those who know him best. He's joining the Phys. Ed. Department at Stouffville High. He'll also teach Math in Grades 9, 10 and 11.

"It's been great," the 36-year-old Windsor native told The Tribune during an interview, Friday, "the staff here has been super and the principal (Lorne Broadway) extremely supportive. I've been very happy."

By moving to S.D.S.S., Jim will be able to carry on with the present Grade 8's and other Summitview graduates. At the same time, he'll be able to retain his residence at Greenbank, north-east of Uxbridge where he resides with wife Patty and sons Jay, five and Sean, three.

In his eleven years at Summitview, Jim has helped produce some excellent students, both academically and athletically. Basketball's his specialty but he also enjoys track and field, hockey and badminton.

"We haven't always come first," he said with respect to inter-school competition, "but it's the trying that counts." Positive reaction from parents is also important, he stresses. Teachers need this.

Jim Fletcher speaks of his school with great respect, the same respect the staff and students hold for him. "I'll put Summitview up against any in Ontario," he concluded.

Open tenders for new arena

STOUFFVILLE — Prices are in on Phase 1 of the Whitchurch-Stouffville Recreation Complex—a new

artificial ice arena. The spread in tenders is just under half a million dollars.

The bids, eight in total, were made public Tuesday night. Two have been withdrawn.

The highest is \$3,419,000. The lowest, (excluding the two that were cancelled), is \$2,950,000.

Members of Council received the tenders with little comment. Mayor Eldred King, however, wondered if miscalculations had occurred in that two firms had submitted prices considerably less than the top four.

It was agreed the tenders should be sent on to Proctor Redfern, the Town's firm of engineering consultants, with the request for an early response.
