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Late Fred Timbers

Champion plowman also judge and coach

STOUFFVILLE - "He who sets his hand to the plow, will enter into the reward of His service."
This was the appropriate theme selected by Rev. Ed Sparks for his remarks at the funeral service for Fred Timbers, Monday afternoon.
Mr Timbers, a lifelong resident of Whitchurch-Stouffville, passed away, Saturday at Parkview Home. He was 78.

Born in Whitchurch Township, the son of Matthew Timbers, he involved himself in all aspects of community life including municipal politics where he served as a councillor and deputy-reeve.

But most of all, he was a professional plowman, a skill that's become a family tradition. In 1937, he competed in the United States and won the North American championship. Later, after winning the Ontario title, he travelled to England, in 1946-47, making the trip over on the Queen Elizabeth and returning on the Queen Mary. Over a period of years, he collected many awards, some of which are now on display at the Markham Museum.

On retirement from active competition, he served as a judge, both at local and international matches. For many years, he was secretary-treasurer of the North York Branch.

For all his interest in the past, Fred Timbers never lost sight of the future. He was always willing to lend a helping hand to young plowmen, within his own family circle and beyond.

Following retirement in 1965, Mr Timbers moved from the farm on the 7th Concession to Main Street East, Stouffville.

For a time, he drove a school bus and assisted with caretaking chores at Parkview. He later became a full-time custodian there and was as well-known around the Home as any of the Residents. He'd been in declining health since Christmas.

A member in the congregation at Dickson's Hill Missionary Church, he later attended at the Christian Church and more recently the Gormley Missionary Church. Often he provided transportation for Parkview friends wishing to attend services at Gormley.

Besides his wife, the former Dorothy Hood, he is survived by two sons, George and Carl, both of Stouffville; a daughter, Ruth, (Mrs Keith Clarke), of Vineland and eight grandchildren.

Rev. Grant Sloss of Markham Missionary Church led in the service, Monday, from the O'Neill Funeral Chapel, with Rev. Sparks bringing the message. Rev. and Mrs Sparks also sang one of Mr Timbers' favorite hymns. Interment was at Dickson's Hill Cemetery.

Pall-bearers were five grandsons-Eric Timbers, Mark Timbers, Charlie Mashin, Greg Clarke, Michael Hotson and John Doner.

Bruce Thomson contributed three singles for Markham, while two-hit performances came from Ian MacRae and Richard Hastings.

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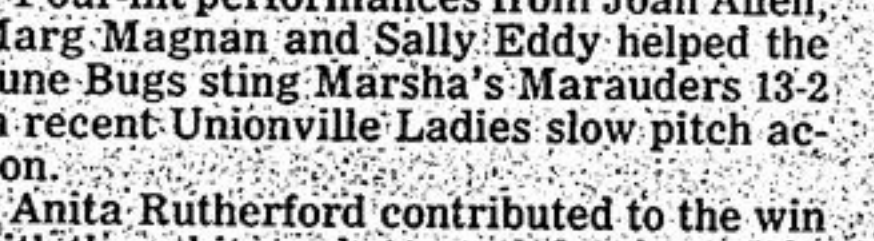
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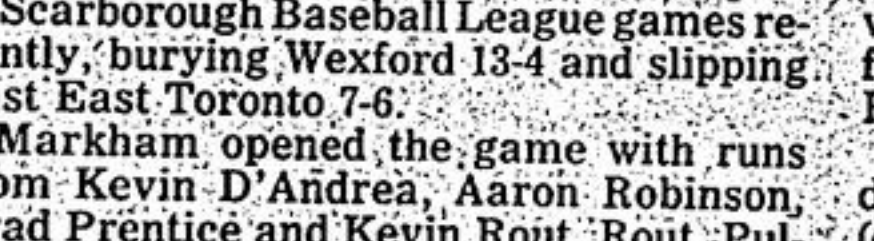
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Harry Eeuwes of Markham won a Yamaha Tri-moto resulting in a draw held last Saturday sponsored by Markville Toyota.
