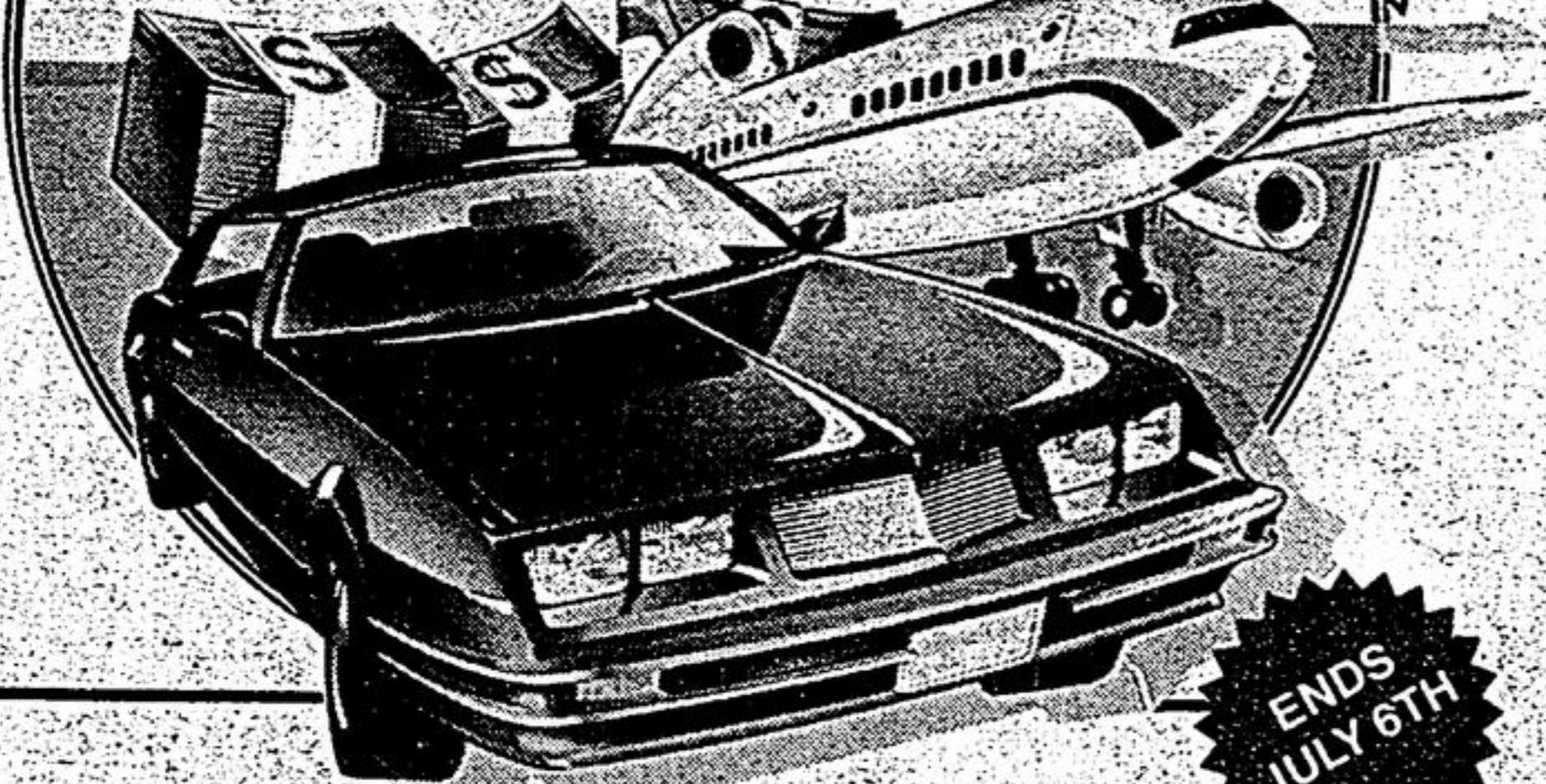

## Agricrew ready to help farmers

The summer has arrived and Agricrew is geared up for another season of work on farms in the counties of Durham and York.

Three crews have been chosen from the 180 applicants who applied to work on Agricrew this summer.

An 'Agricrew' consists of four young individuals who will be working together from June 25 to Aug. 17. The crews all have farm work experience and are prepared to work an eight-hour day at a cost of \$90 to the farmer.

Crews provide their own transportation and lunch and are completely covered by worker's compensation and unemployment insurance.

In the past, this program has been highly successful and as a result, has expanded every year. This summer the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture and Food has 76 crews working throughout the province.

Some previous jobs done by Agricrew include hoeing, painting, picking stones, fencing and pruning fruit trees, etc.

"Being totally pampered" is what Jane Collett says she guarantees at the skin and body care facility that recently opened at a newly created address - 61 Main St., Markham.

Markham Mayor Carole Bell attended the June 20 ribbon cutting of Total Esthetic Care which has just been relocated from Unionville.

Ms. Collett and six other women are all professionals in skin and body care and fitness. They offer a great number of services including facials, treatments for problem skin, personal makeup lessons, muscle-toning cellulite treatments, manicures, pedicures, and exercise classes, all with Beverly Hills style. Ms. Col-

lett, who has been in business 15 years, sums it up as "a day of care."

Ms. Collett describes her business as a personal place where one would come and spend a full day. It might be classified as a small club instead of a beauty salon.

Total Esthetic Care is highly geared towards pregnant women and those over 40 who wouldn't feel comfortable in a large noisy room full of young girls. Says Ms. Collett's, "It is a place for ladies to come and relax, enjoy an easy atmosphere by being totally pampered, and to release their tension without feeling pressured."

At the moment men are not part of the program, but if a demand arises, services may be added.

## Markham firm installs speakers in new centre

A Markham company is installing the sound system in the main exhibition hall of the new Metro Toronto Convention Centre.

The centre, which opens this summer, is the biggest in Canada. It is almost large enough for the Toronto Argonauts, Blue Jays and Maple Leafs to play side by side.

"It's a huge place," said Frank Detlor, vice president of Pace Safety Systems Inc. "The acoustics present quite a challenge."

Add a wide variety of exhibitions and displays to be held at the convention centre and the calculations involved in producing a good sound system become complex.

"The various displays will change acoustics," explained Mr. Detlor. "Acoustics from, say, industrial equipment and those from furniture are different. Hard, flat surfaces cause sound to bounce around while textured surfaces absorb sound."

The hall will

accommodate 12,000 people at one time, 7,000 seated. People create good acoustics. More calculations

The sound system will use three banks of speakers, one at the east end, one in the middle and one at the west end. Each bank will have two columns of speakers, one of 12 and another of eight.

The system was designed by Santa Monica, California, consultants Paul F. Veneklasen and Associates, with architects Crang and Boak and electrical engineers Mulvey and Banani International Inc. Pace Safety Systems, Denison St., Markham, is also installing sound systems in the convention centre ballroom and meeting rooms and the public areas at L'Hotel, the adjoining CN Hotel.

The company also has the contract for fire and communication systems at the convention centre, hotel and the office tower at the west end of the Front St. development.

There is a speaker in every room at the hotel and in hallways and stairways so that firefighters can advise guests on how to leave should there be an alarm.

Firefighters will be aided by a fully computerized fire protection system incorporating smoke detectors and a sophisticated sprinkler system, reversible fans for smoke control and fire-separation doors that close automatically.

"The consultant actually exceeded the minimum fire regulations to produce what we think is the best possible system," said Mr. Detlor. Pace Safety Systems has more than 20 years experience and has carried out projects in Toronto including the Sun Life Centre, the Atrium on Bay, and renovations at the Royal Ontario Museum and the King Edward Hotel.
