Develop?

BALLANTRAE — Rural development has been badly planned and, as far as most residents attending the June 20 public meeting at the Ballantrae Community Centre are concerned, undertaken without consideration of the best interests of the countryside and health of residents.

These and other complaints were voiced at a discussion attended by Councillors Margot Marshall and Tom Wood representatives for Wards 1 and 2.

Most in the audience appeared incensed over what they described as scattered development throughout the municipality. They insisted that build-up take place within existing hamlets, not on open parcels of land.

Considerable concern was also shown regarding the proposal to proceed with the Sabiston Subdivision containing 100 homes and other development close to the land-fill site.

Herb Peach, a Ballantrae area resident 27 years, made an impassioned plea to Council to get their planning in order. "We've spent thousands of dollars on planning future development, which changes yearly. Forget attracting light industry here, we have nothing to offer in the way of services. Industry will come to Stouffville maybe ten years down the road. In the meantime, don't ruin our countryside with parcel lots and small subdivisions. Let's preserve it and develop where hamlets are already established," he said.

His remarks received enthusiastic applause.

Brian Tinker, Chairman of the Rural Ratepayers Association, echoed the speaker's sentiments when he said: "We do not want massive development in this area."

Considerable concern was shown by former councillor Jim Doble, regarding development close to the land-fill site: "You have 100 houses at Sabiston's and another 40 on Jesse Thompson Road. How can you possibly go ahead with development when you haven't yet received the Health Study Report that was promised in June? These developments are dangerously close to the dump and it could affect their wells," he said.

Wood countered by asking if he (Doble) would suggest stopping all development because of the dump. "Council is under pressure from developers and people want to move into the area," he stated.

Tragedy

The death of a thirteen-year-old Aurora boy from injuries received in a fall and by electrocution, has shocked and saddened a wide circle of area friends and relatives.

Christopher Ardern of Forent Crescent, was killed in his parents' yard, June 22, when he lost his balance while playing in a tree with three friends. The victim clutched a hydro wire for support and fell thirty feet to the ground. He was pronounced dead on arrival at York County Hospital, Newmarket.

Chris is the only child of Bill Ardern and Gail Sellers. He is the grandson of Pat and Gerry Ardern, Toronto and the late Alma (Hill) and Ernest Bonisteel, a nephew of Ron and Kathérine Clifton of Ottawa, stepbrother of Scott and Jeff Sellers, stepson of Tony Sellers and family, great-nephew of Ernest and Elsie Davis Vandorf; Laura Logan, Stouffville; George and Edna Teasdale, Newmarket; Russell Hill and family, Peterborough; Howard and Mary Hill, Claremont; Alex and Walter Hill and the late Erma Fairies.

Hundreds of children and their parents called at the Thompson Funeral Home, Aurora and attended the service, June 26. The floral tributes were beautiful.

Rev. Moffat of Aurora United Church delivered the message, with interment, Aurora Cemetery.
