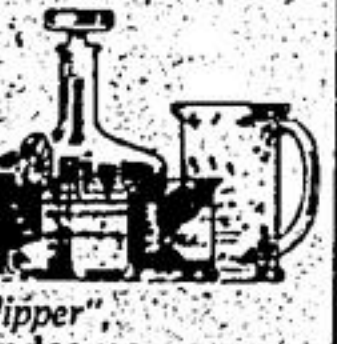

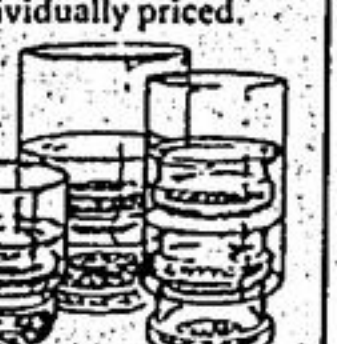

# Stouffville piper plays in World Championships

**STOUFFVILLE** — The neighbors aren't complaining; the exact opposite. They're extending congratulations. For the shrill of the pipes that, on occasions, can be heard as far south as Main Street, has brought honor to Chris Barker, 107 Manitoba Street and to Whitechurch-Stouffville. Chris is a member of the 78th Fraser Highlanders Pipe Band that placed

third in the World Pipe Band Championships at Bellahouston Park, Glasgow, Scotland.

Close to 5,000 bandmen attended including one other Canadian entry from St. Catharines. Chris and 29 other pipers, including Cam McDonald, formerly of Vivian, left Aug. 8 and returned Aug. 16.

Competition was extremely keen with the 78th Fraser's scoring a second and a fourth for a third place finish. Current North American Champions, they were categorized in the top competitive class.

They finished in seventh spot last year and hope to return in '85. Sales of a long-play record will help underwrite the cost.

Chris described the band's performance as "exceptionally good." They placed first in Best Overseas Band and first in Best Marching and Disciplined Band.

Four months prior to the World Championships, the unit "worked out" three times a week. Between times, Chris "worked in" a few additional practices from his backyard. He hopes it didn't disturb the neighbors or panic their pets. If it did, they declined to complain. Could be, residents of Manitoba Street are Scots and thrill to the sound.

World Championships. Five thousand bandmen took part. The only other Canadian entry was from St. Catharines. —Jim Thomas
