Dining with Cal

 Carnegie Place, Woodbine Avenue, Markham, our destination this evening, can best be described as 'all show'. The service is excellent and the dining room is elegant with glowing candles, fine linen and a lovely fireplace. These dimensions are, of course, very important when looking for a special toe-touching, intimate atmosphere. Remembering, however, that the food must also be included and the potential diner must carry a heavy billfold, we are disappointed. Cathryn and I enjoy our smoked appetizers and before-dinner cocktails, but that is the extent of the food that we can call acceptable. My entree of barbecued back ribs in honey is overcooked. It is also recognizable for what it is by the lack of meat that would please any vegetarian. Cathryn's surf and turf is wallet-emptying and the lobster tails, extremely dry. We cannot leave the entrees without mentioning the overcooked carrots accompanying tonight's meal, a sign of kitchen inefficiency. Desserts of cheese cake and liquor farts are run-of-the-mill and pricey. We finish our dinner with coffee and tea; empty our wallets and leave. Yes, friends, if you're looking for a romantic, classy place, this is it! I would suggest, however, that you eat before you arrive. This way, the evening will be perfect. The Carnegie Place is fully licenced and formal attire is required. Dinner for two with wine is \$60 to \$70. COMING SOON - The Shangri-la, Woodbine Avenue, Markham.

St. James Presbyterian Church Welcomes new pastor

STOUFFVILLE — Charlotte, North Carolina is far removed from Stouffville, Ontario; but for Rev. Herb Gale, there's a striking similarity—the friendliness of the people. "Canadians, like those of the southern United States, are polite," he says, "although here, that politeness is more reserved until they get to know a person."

In the weeks ahead, the congregation of St. James Presbyterian Church will be getting to know Rev. Gale. For he's their new pastor with duties commencing this Sunday, Sept. 2. Worship time is 11 a.m.

Rev. Gale said he chose to enroll at the Toronto School of Theology so as to obtain a different perspective outside the United States. His place of residence was Knox College.

Despite the fact Toronto is a much larger city than Charlotte, the adjustment has not been difficult. Nor has there been a separation between friends and family. Because they and he must travel farther, they tend to remain longer, he says. Rev. Gale

has two older brothers, Jim, a high school teacher and Russ, a banker. He tries to get 'home' at least once during the summer and at Christmas. Rev. Gale said he'd earlier passed through Stouffville en route to (where else), the Flea Market. But his introduction to St. James came

through association with the Pulpit Search Committee. If he was impressed with them, the committee was equally impressed with him. And so were members of the congregation. The 'invitation' was unanimous. "This is a future-oriented congregation," he says. I'm witness-

ing a spirit of fellowship, an eagerness to grow, both spiritually and in community outreach as well as numbers. Although a Youth Director at his own church in Charlotte, he says he appreciates the 'age balance' that he sees at St. James. Rev. Gale enjoys music and

sees this as an important part of every church service. While nothing 'official' transpires until September, Rev. Gale already feels a part of the St. James' fellowship. He attended the congregation's picnic at Bruce's Mill Conservation Area in June and

has participated in numerous work bees at the manse this summer. "I'm excited about getting back into the ministry," he says, anticipating his first service here, Sept. 2. Following a nine-month absence of a permanent pastor, that 'excitement' he speaks about is spreading.
