London wins ball title

UXBRIDGE—To say London's Ted Diltz ladies slow pitch team is in a class by itself is putting it rather mildly. The London club solidified their number one ranking by sweeping the Provincial Women's Softball Association (P.W.S.A.) All-

Ontario grand championship in Uxbridge over the weekend. They thrashed host Underhill Flowers 10-0 in five innings Sunday to capture their fifth consecutive P.W.S.A. title. Through their tournament games, Ted Diltz scored a total of 66 runs while allowing only three against. The club will put their near-perfect record on the line next weekend in the world championships at Fort Wayne, Indiana. Even though they couldn't compete with London's power hitting and precise fielding, Underhill Flowers still played well enough to win the silver medal. Uxbridge blanked eventual bronze-medal winning Un-

ionville A&A Records Thumpers 8-0 en route to the final. Underhill - paced by tournament MVP Laurie Paradine who hit .714 for the weekend - disposed of Stouffville's Country Stop 13-3 in their opener. They then beat Miliken Mills 14-4, before dropping a Sunday morning encounter to Ted Diltz 15-3. Their second defeat later in the day ended the double-knock-out event. Uxbridge's other P.W.S.A. entrant, Dominion Auto, also

found the going tough. They were mercied by the Ted Diltz girls 16-0 in the opener and then lost 5-2 to Unionville. Country Stop was eliminated from play, when they dropped a close 3-2 decision to the other Stouffville team - Betz Pools. Betz were knocked out of contention 5-0 by Unionville. Other teams taking part in the three-day tournament were Barrie, Markham and Brookdale.

Nurses offer home care

PICKERING — The Victorian Order of Nurses (VON) believes that the best place in the world to recover from illness is in the familiar surroundings of home.

Therefore, providing quality nursing service on a visit basis to individuals and families has become their primary function.

The VON, a United Way agency, was first established in Canada in 1897. This early formation was in response to a need for nursing care in the outlying districts in the far west.

It quickly became apparent that it was impractical for nurses to travel long distances on horseback and sleigh, so the Order established cottage hospitals to which sick settlers could be brought.

As Canada's health care has become more structured, these hospitals have been handed over to local groups. This has allowed the VON to return to its roots and to go back to the home setting where they provide an alternative to institutional health care. The Durham Region branch was established in 1914 and is celebrating its 70th birthday this year. The nine nurses working in the Ajax-Pickering area made a total of 6,795 visits to local homes during the 1983-84 year.

For all patients, particularly the elderly and chronically or terminally ill, nursing care in the home enables them to maintain their independence as long as possible. It also makes earlier discharge from hospital workable.

Often there is no direct cost for a VON visit. It may be covered through a Home Care program or an insurance plan. However, there may be a charge per visit. Fees are put on a sliding scale according to your ability to pay. Many United Way dollars go into this effort to make the VON program accessible to everyone.

United Way funds also allow for the provision of nursing assessments to patients and families free of charge. In addition, all bereavement visit to families where care has been provided is at no cost.

The VON readily admits its debt to United Way supporters. The organization appeals to Ajax-Pickering residents to be as generous as possible with their 1984 donation.
