Fred, a native of our town, has served his country and community well. As a member of the Canadian Army, he served overseas during World War II and was taken prisoner at Dieppe. He remained a prisoner-of-war until the end of the conflict. On his return, Bert Clarkson, Harold Morden and Fred established the Veterans' Construction Company. Many excavations and building projects locally were the result of their handiwork. He later joined the staff of a local gravel company as a maintenance engineer.

Fred was instrumental in the formation of the Stouffville Branch of the Canadian Legion and for many years has been the Sergeant Major at local Remembrance Day parades.

His service as a member of the Stouffville Fire Department continued until illness forced his retirement. Along with Lloyd Jennings and Chief Walter Smith, he has been honored by the Ontario Volunteer Firefighters' Association for having attained more than 30 years' service.

Fred's wife Marion has been an active member of the Stouffville Branch of the Canadian Cancer Society and the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Stouffville Legion.

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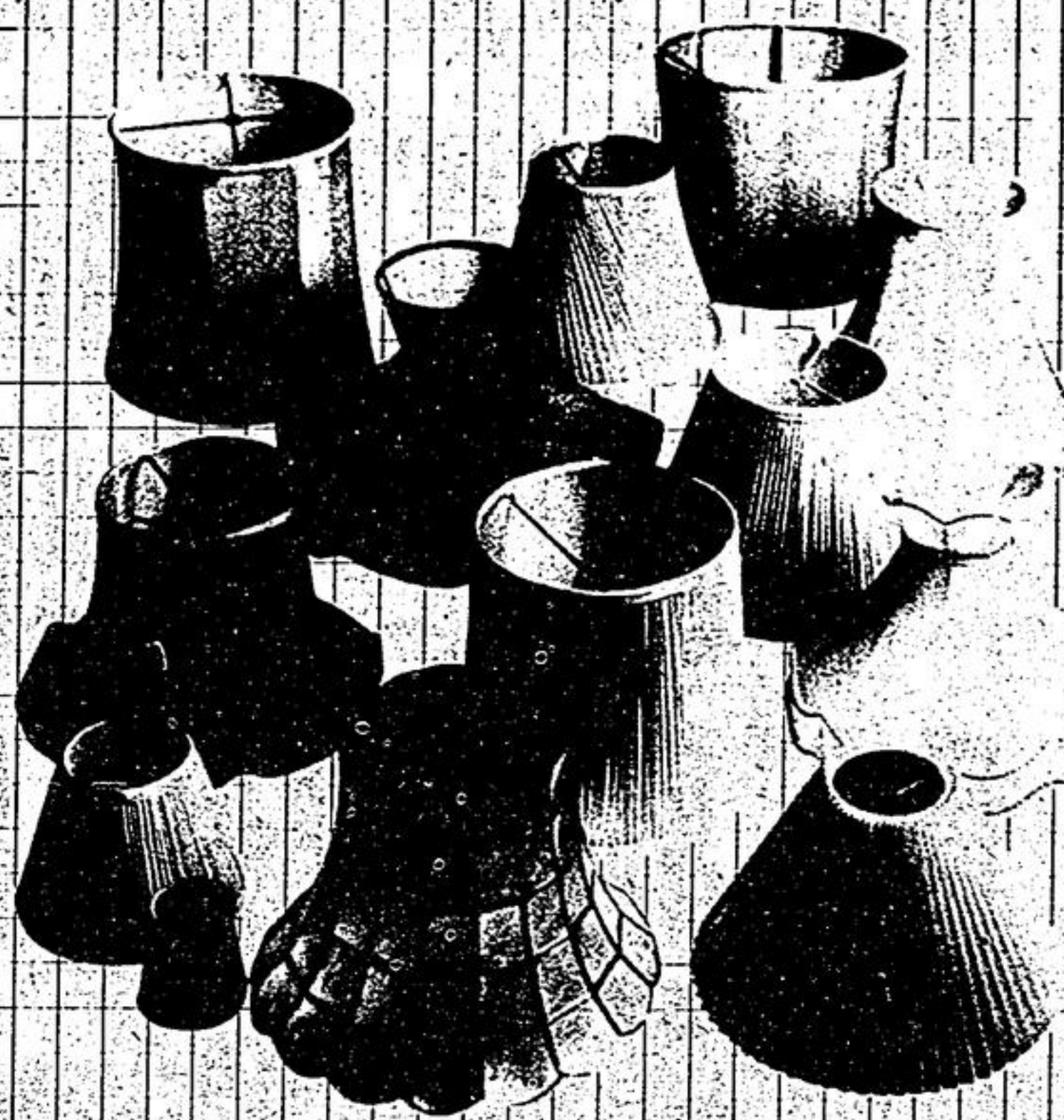

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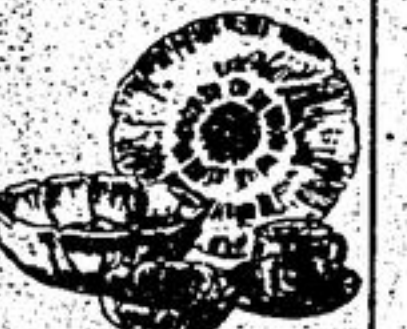
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
