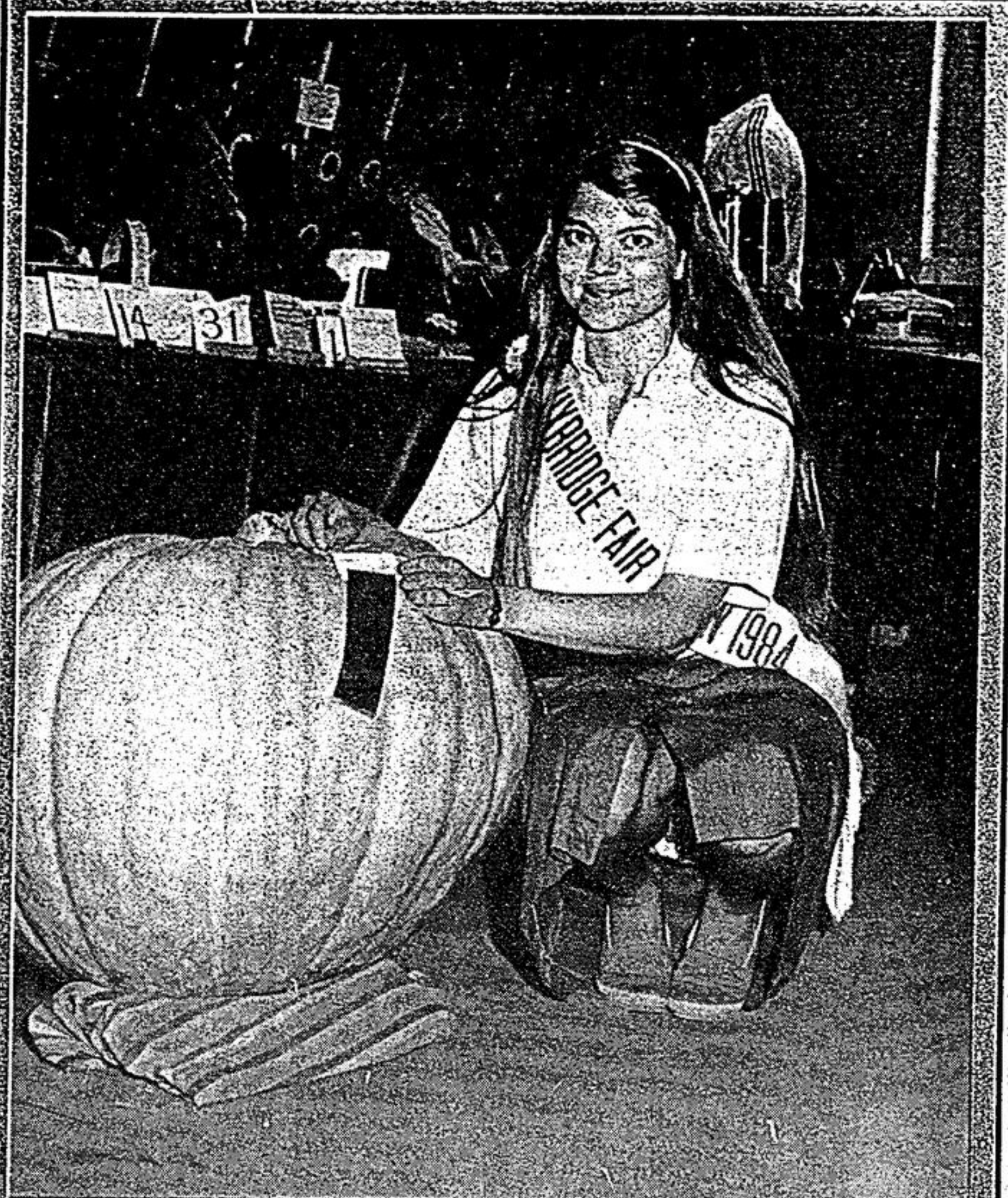

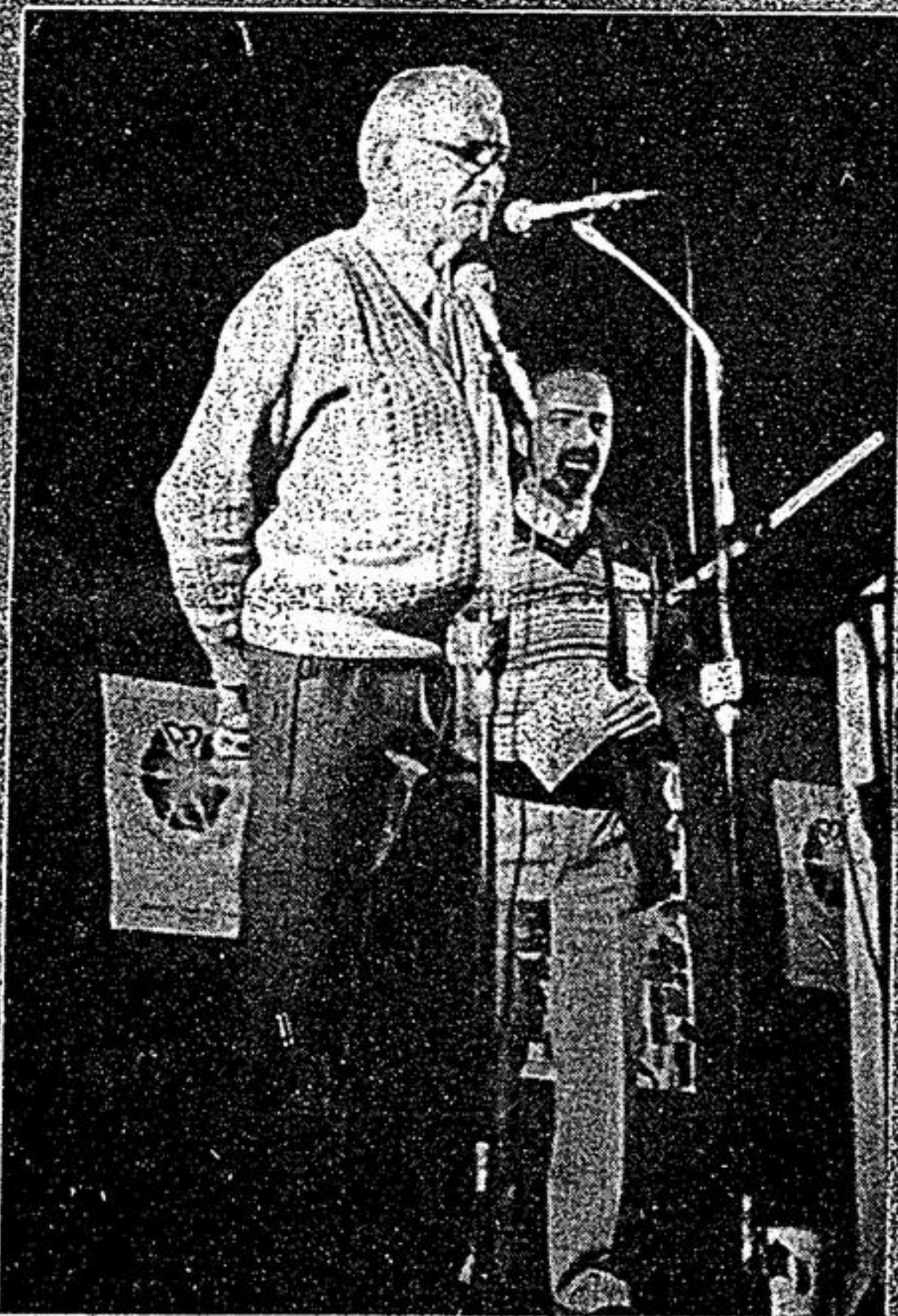
Thousands enjoy Uxbridge Fair



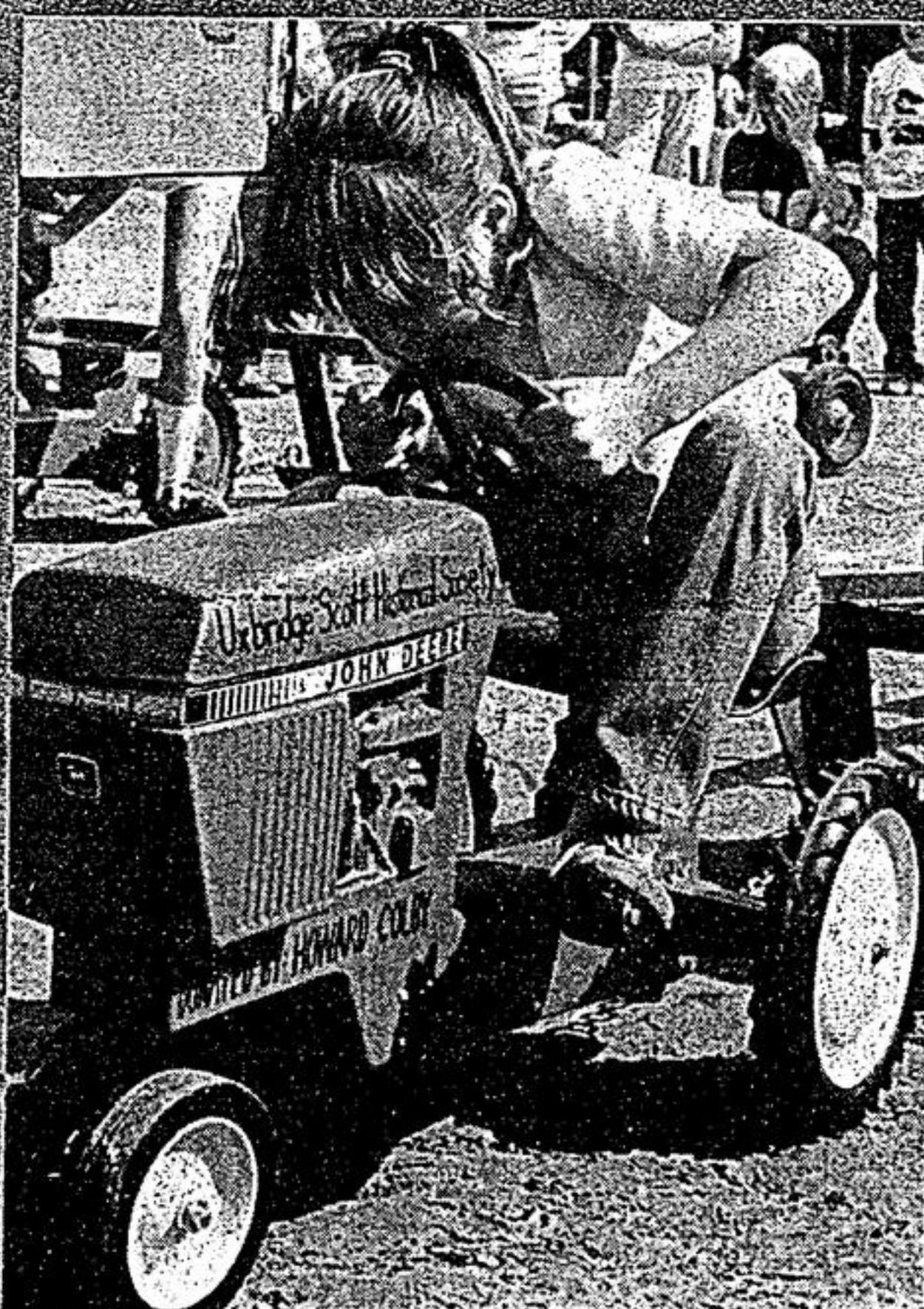

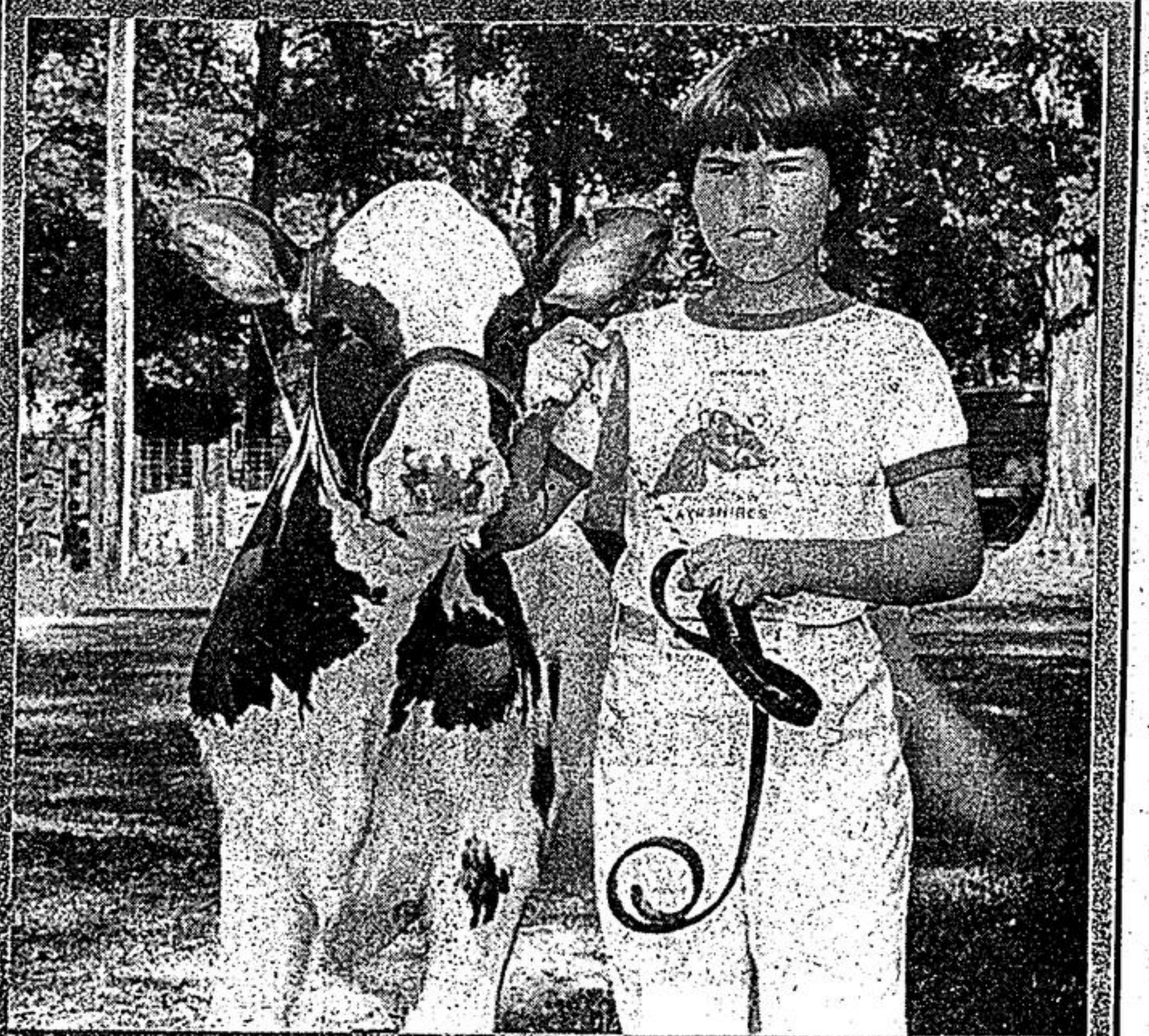
