STOUFFVILLE — It was back in 1949 that Stouffville's Floyd Forsyth entered his first International Plowing Match. The location was Lindsay. In the 35 years since, he's missed only two, and for good reason. He was plowing in competitions elsewhere. Although sometimes suggesting he should retire, Floyd will compete again next week at Teviotdale, near Harriston. The awards banquet is planned for the Harriston-Minto Community Centre, Sept. 28. Floyd Forsyth's record as a professional plowman is outstanding. He placed third in the Canadian Championships at Prince Edward Island in 1983 after winning the Ontario Title at Lucan, near London in '82.

In 1970, he participated in the World Match at Denmark and served as a coach for the Canadian entry in 1976. The host country was Sweden.
Floyd's also won countless awards in branch matches and plans to enter the York Regional contest this Saturday, (Sept. 22), on the farm of Larry and Wilf Rose near Mount Albert.

Bloomington-Woodbine bad accident corner

WHITCHURCH — The intersection of Woodbine Avenue and the Bloomington Road is presently the most hazardous in all of York Region according to a statistical report prepared by the Regional Engineering Department in co-operation with regional police.
During a 29-month period, from Jan. 1, 1982 to May 31, 1984, a total of 66 motor vehicle collisions occurred at this corner. Sixteen of these were after dark.
The report points out that 58 of the 66 accidents occurred after Hwy. 404 was opened to the Bloomington Road. The volume of traffic increased considerably at that time.
Once Hwy. 404 is completed through to the Aurora Road, (fall of 1985), the accident rate should decrease, the report says.

Other accident prone intersections in the area follow: Woodbine Avenue and Davis Drive, (31); Woodbine Avenue and the Stouffville Road, (28); Bayview Avenue and the Aurora Road, (22); Mount Albert Road and Conc. 2, East Gwillimbury, (17); Woodbine Avenue and 16th Avenue, Markham, (15).
The stretch of Woodbine Avenue between the Bloomington Road and the Aurora Road also took its toll. There were 55 collisions, 33 of which occurred on the section between the Bloomington Road and the Vandorf Road. The other 22 occurred between the Vandorf Road and the Aurora Road.
Once again, with the extension of Hwy. 404 through to the Aurora Road, this accident total should drop dramatically, the report concludes.
