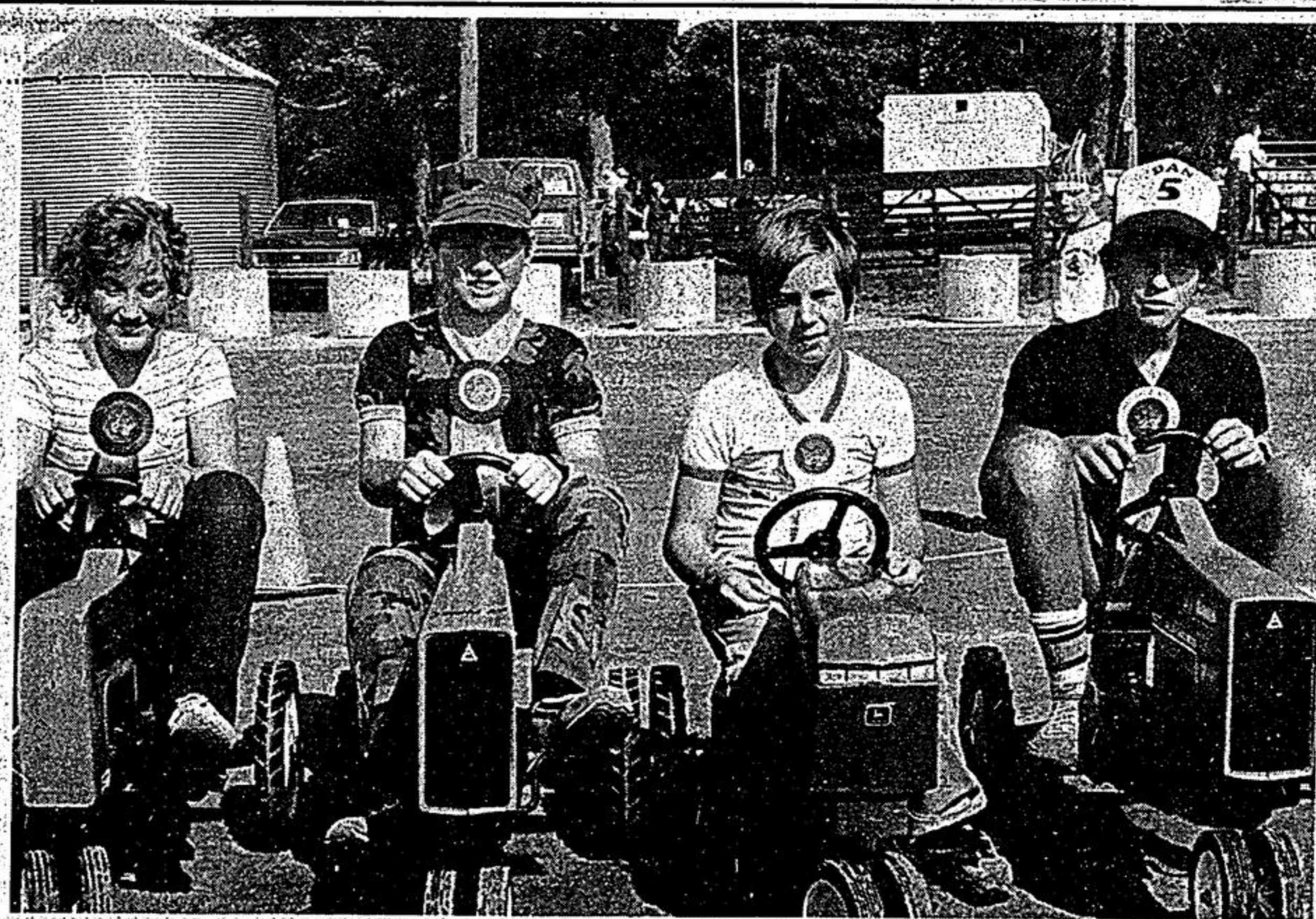
All Durham Region schools will be hives of activity during Education Week, running April 22 to 26.
