Nestled on the quiet North Wilcox Lake Road, east of Yonge Street, Cathryn and I experience Italian cuisine at its finest at L'Altro Mondo (The Other World). This quaint, unpretentious dining room is not overcrowded tonight. It still seems untouched by city-dwellers looking for that special out-of-the-way country spot.

One of the outstanding features of the establishment is the twenty-five selection menu. They specialize in veal and home-made pasta dishes. My tastebuds tingle with anticipation.

On most occasions, Cathryn and I enjoy before-dinner cocktails. Tonight, with our surroundings and fare in mind, we select a very dry Italian red wine to enjoy before and during the meal.

My entree, Escalope of Veal Parmigiana, is served hot, tasty and is very filling. This dish of veal cutlet, topped with thick slices of parmigian cheese, should please all veal lovers.

Cathryn picks Chicken Puccini as her entree. It looks interesting and proves mouth-pleasing. This main course is comprised of chicken, thinned with onion, mushroom and wine sauce.

Our dessert treat called Cannoli, is pastry, rolled up with a rich cheese pudding—very satisfying.

To round out the evening, Cathryn enjoys Cappuccino while I choose good old espresso coffee.

The restaurant is fully licenced. Service is discreet and well-timed. Dinner for two, with wine, is \$25 to \$30 and worth every penny.
