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## Prov. Title for Town plowman

**STOUFFVILLE** — Whitchurch-Stouffville's Floyd Forsyth has put the Town on the map — again.

He won the Ontario Tractor Plowing Championship at the International Match near Harriston, Saturday. The Reserve Champion is Ken Ferguson, also of Whitchurch-Stouffville.

Both now advance to the Canadian Championships in New Brunswick next fall. The World Match is scheduled for Alberta in 1986.

It was a neck-and-neck battle between Floyd For-

syth of Stouffville and Keith Robinson of Cookstown for the right to plow in the provincials. It wasn't until the awards banquet in Harriston, Friday, that Floyd learned he had the edge.

Previously, Floyd had a first, a second and two thirds while Keith had two seconds, a third and a fourth.

Other participants in the provincials Saturday included Barry Timbers, Milton; Herb Jarvis, Agincourt; Eric Timbers, Stouffville and Stephen Dunkeld, Zephyr.

In top-level competition, Floyd Forsyth's record follows: Ontario Reserve Champion in 1968; Canadian Champion in 1969; Ontario Champion in 1982; Canadian Finalist (3rd), in 1983. He plowed in the World Match at Denmark in 1970.

The Ontario Horse Plowing Champion is Andrew McRobbie of Mt. Forest. The Reserve Champion is Ross Miller, Sunderland.

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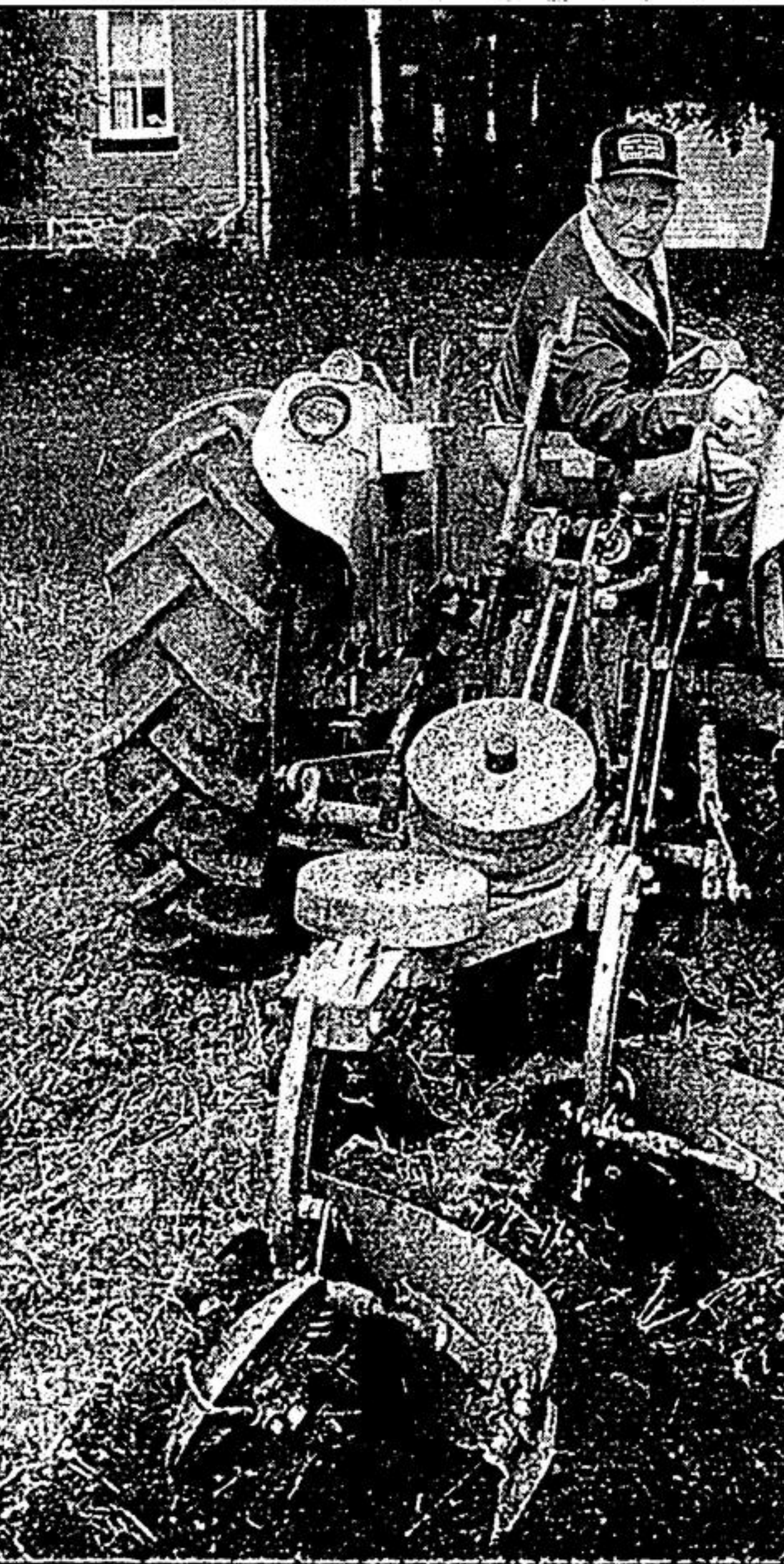
## Damage six cars
