Ajax-Pickering United Way

Sets goal at \$391,000

PICKERING — A main challenge of the Pickering-Ajax United Way in 1984 is to bring the level of contribution up to the provincial average.

And local volunteers are confident that they can meet this year's goal of \$391,000.

It's a fact that the average income per household in Pickering or Ajax is higher than most Ontario communities. Yet the area's 1983 per capita gift to the United Way was \$4.80.

This compares to the provincial average of \$8.98.

Workers believe residents in Pickering will feel good in the knowledge that their donation is

being processed through an efficient organization.

United Way operating costs are kept to a minimum with only 13.4 per cent of total revenue going to administration.

The bulk of the funds are returned to the community through the services of its 20 agencies.

One of these, the Canadian Red Cross Society, has a special partnership with its blanket organization.

About 90 per cent of Red Cross programs are run by volunteers, working at all levels from policy setting to service delivery.

The contribution of time and energy made by these peo-

ple enable the provision of services to the general public at little or no cost.

The blood donor program is one example. It depends on helpers to organize clinics, register blood donors and

work in the rest bed and refreshment areas.

The Red Cross has taken on a massive job, one that would not be possible without this community effort.

Still, there are 19

other United Way groups that all benefit greatly from public contributions. Some, like the Canadian National Institute for the Blind, are even more dependent on volunteer assistance.

At present, Ward 2 Councillor Tom Wood is filling the position made vacant by Eldred King's ascendency to the Chairmanship of York Region. Councillor Wood has indicated he'd be willing to shoulder this responsibility, at least until the end of the current term.
