


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640-4646**Sears Ltd.****Bring back

STOUFFVILLE — Door-to-door parcel delivery by Sears has been reinstated in Whitchurch-Stouffville.

The decision to once again provide this service was announced last week.

"We had a lot of complaints," a company spokesperson told The Tribune.

Cancellation of the service would have meant travelling to the nearest Sears' Order Office which, for some residents was Newmarket.

"It would have been an inconvenience," the employee said.

In an effort to cover costs, Sears has established a delivery charge—two dollars on cash purchases; \$1.50 on account purchases and ten dollars on large items like chesterfields and refrigerators.


As a member of this council and society, I have grave concerns about what's been happening," responded Regional Chairman Eldred King, also a member of the Police Commission.

**Capital punishment
plea by councillor**

YORK REGION — Related to the recent deaths of Constables Douglas Tribbling and William Grant, York Regional Council has requested an emergent meeting with the Police Commission.

Two-men patrols, capital punishment and ways to protect on-duty officers will be main topics of discussion.

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Markham Mayor Carole Bell said she'd re-

ceived several calls regarding the matter of police protection and what she described as "the two unfortunate occurrences."

"The calls I'm getting are for the safety of our police officers," said Mrs. Bell. "They're really concerned. But they're also concerned with policing in the urban areas. It is important to set up this meeting and discuss all police matters fully."

"What's the use of holding the taxes down when we have so many thefts from the public and the business community. I think the rate-payers are prepared to pay more money."

Reacting to an article in a Toronto daily, Markham Regional Councillor Bud Bonner thought the topic of how police conduct themselves when approaching a situation involving the public should be discussed.

"I watched an item on television where it was stated that in the Ottawa area, police will be stopping people with their guns drawn," said Bonner.

"Chief (Bruce) Crawford has said officers will do what's necessary to protect themselves. I think we have to get things straight. It's urgent to hold this meeting."

Chairman King ended the debate by saying he'd arrange it early November.

Prior to the meeting, a minute's silence was observed for Constable Grant who died on duty Oct. 9. His police cruiser was rammed by a straight Markham teenager, who later committed suicide.

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
