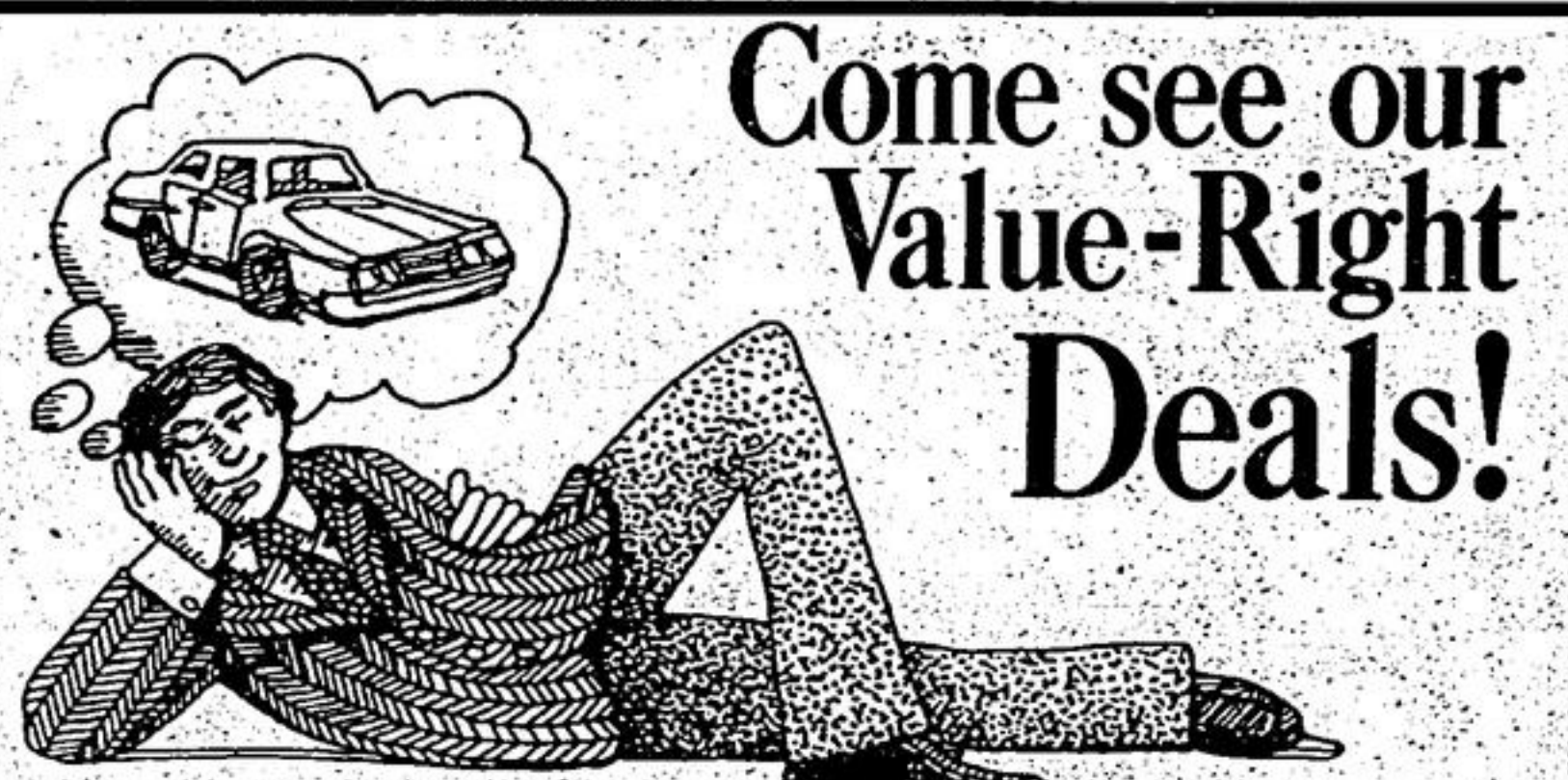
This year, with more members, the Band promises to be as good or even better. Their initial public appearance is Commencement Night, Nov. 9.

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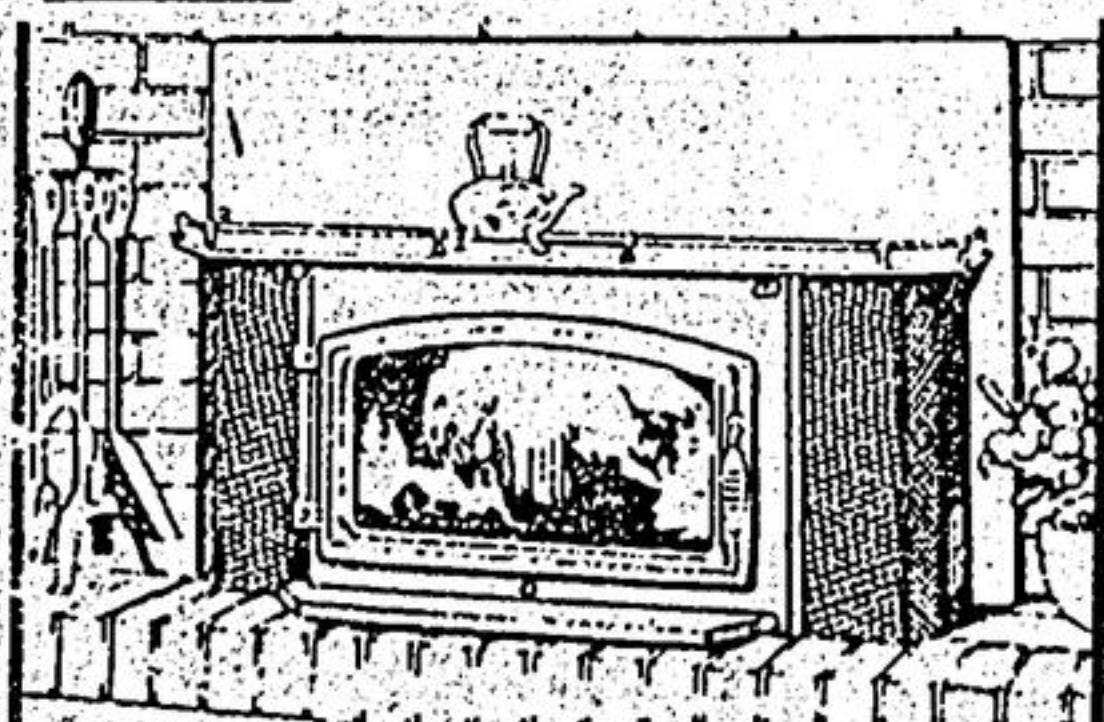
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
