 An Open House will be held in honor of Frank and Della Moore who will be celebrating their 20th wedding anniversary on Saturday, Nov. 17. It

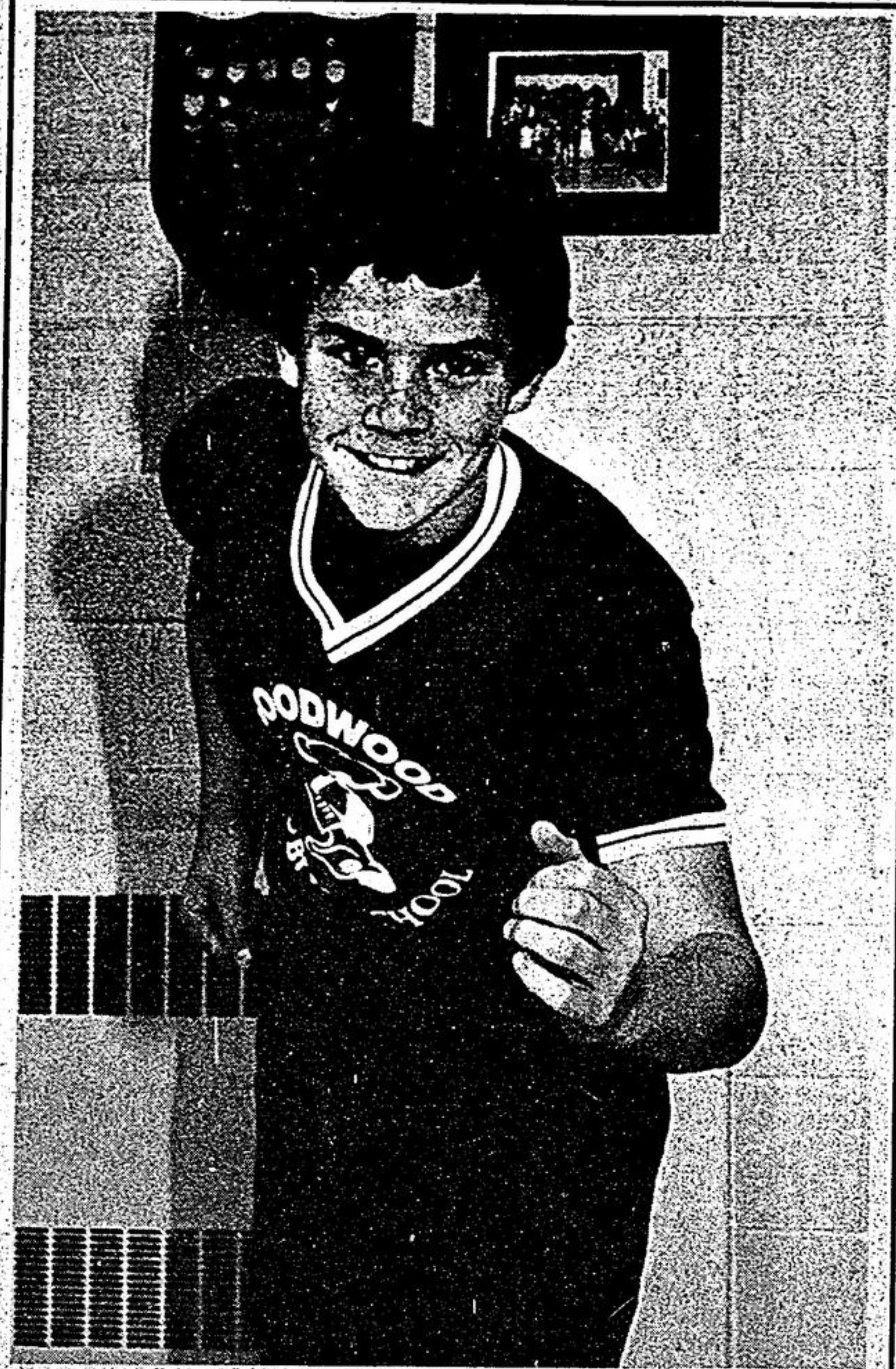

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Going was tough but-- Plowers show stuff at regional meet

DURHAM REGION — An entry representing Uxbridge Twp. found the going tough at the first annual Durham Region Public Works Association snowplow competition, Saturday.
 Municipal employees Jack Symes and Jack Harper, both of Uxbridge, placed seventeenth in a field of 18 teams.
 The snowplow duo scored 298 out of a possible 450 points.
 Durham's Oshawa-Whitby crew won the event with a total of 405 points, followed by Seugog Twp. in second place with 398 points and the Town of Ajax in third with 397.
 The competition, held at the regional depot in Oshawa, included a written test on the rules of the road, a circle check of a vehicle (to find defects) and a driving segment.
 The Public Works Association is attempting to increase public awareness of the tasks performed by Durham's winter maintenance men.
 The snowplow meet was organized as a friendly competition between all municipalities within the region.
