Stouffville Novices earn last-minute tie

With thirty seconds to play, Novice captain Geoff Smith turned an anticipated loss into an unexpected tie.

The hard-working team leader fired a low shot past Danny Stewart in the Port Hope net, Friday, to give Stouffville a 1-1 tie. Sean Morrison picked up an assist.

The Stouffville team, sponsored by Neil Patrick Motors, was full value for the tie. They had a wide territorial advantage but Port Hope had the best close-in shots. Dayne Vanderligt in the Stouffville net blocked twelve drives. Stewart

turned aside eight.

Port Hope's Michael Jackson opened the scoring at 4:25 of the second period. It appeared likely this tally would be the winner until Smith completed a cyclonic rush down right wing and beat the Port Hope puck-stopper cleanly.

Geoff Smith's fine two-way performance highlighted the contest. He was as strong in his own end of the rink as on the Port Hope side of the blueline. David Mountjoy, Coulter Carconi and John McKinnon also excelled up front.

Vanderligt turned in

several excellent saves when Port Hope forwards were 'home free'. Two of his best were on Brian Bernard and Darryl Austin, both in the second period. Colter Carconi had a golden opportunity to tie the score in the third but his shot to the corner hit a skate and missed the target.

This Friday, (Nov. 9), Port Perry are the visitors here. Game time is 7 p.m.

Other players in the Stouffville lineup include Jason Brown, Michael Boyd, Jason Reesor, Lindsey Haylow, Phil Fridham, Ryan Jefferson, Brad Goode, Chad Dickinson and Brian Coughlin.

Uxbridge Bruins rebounded from a 7-4 loss at the hands of Little Britain Merchants Friday to post their most convincing effort of the season in Bomanville Sunday night.

Paul MacEwen scored two goals and assisted on another to pace Uxbridge to a 6-4 win over the defending league champions, Bomanville Eagles.

That victory brought the Bruin win-loss record to 2-6 after the first eight games of the Central Ontario Junior C Hockey League campaign.

While Uxbridge is battling with Cobourg Cougars for the bottom two positions in the eight-team loop, Bruin coach Wayne Redshaw feels it's simply a matter of time until his club makes a move.

"If we ever start to score, watch out!" coach Redshaw commented Friday, following a game in which the Bruins outshot their opposition 43-29 but still lost.

"It isn't from a lack of

And the coach's optimistic forecast began to come true Sunday as his players found the scoring touch that was lacking in past encounters.

MacEwen's big game against Bomanville was supplemented by a goal and two assists off the stick of Bruin veteran Scott Harper. His tally was unassisted.

Other goals came from Todd Laroche, Sean Convery and Shane Campsall. Laroche also had two assists and Cliff Freckleton one.

Troy Bates came up with a strong performance in the Uxbridge goal.

Scoring for the Bruins in Friday's loss to Little Britain were Freckleton, assisted by Henry Van Kessel (shorthanded); Brian Stewart from Laroche (powerplay); Laroche, assisted by Stewart and Campsall; and Lee Brown, unassisted.
