Committee joins fight against porn

STOUFFVILLE — What is pornography? A Task Force Report, sponsored by The United Church of Canada, describes it as follows:

"Pornography is material that represents or describes degrading, abusive and/or violent behavior for sexual gratification so as to endorse and/or recommend the behavior depicted."

Does the availability of pornographic material pose a problem in Whitchurch-Stouffville?

Colleen Bacon, head of the Outreach Committee for Stouffville United Church, isn't sure. But her committee intends to find out. Groups, in teams of two, plan to check all variety drug and video stores in town, to ascertain just what's being sold and then address the issue on the basis of what they discover.

On Nov. 20, Mrs. Bacon appeared before a meeting of the United Church Board and explained the committee's planned approach to the matter. There was little reaction one way or another, Rev. Cecil Tiller, the church's pastor, said.

The result was much the same when the proposal was made public to the congregation. "I heard no comment, whatsoever," Rev. Tiller told The Tribune. "I was surprised."

Mrs. Bacon said she personally became concerned when pornography was made such a prominent issue in Toronto and other cities across Ontario. She admitted controversy related to a recent issue of Penthouse had brought the matter to a head.

If the committee's investigation reveals pornographic material available in local stores, objections will be voiced and the owners will be asked to remove such publications from their shelves.

The committee has expressed interest in holding a public meeting, with an officer of the Pornography Squad in attendance. A public discussion of the Task Force Report is also being considered.

Rev. Tiller told The Tribune he had first wished the matter brought before a meeting of the Ministerial Association, but to date, this opportunity hadn't presented itself.

The eleven-page report claims Canada's pornography industry to be a 500 million dollar-a-year business that grosses over \$10 billion in North America. Of the \$10 billion, close to \$2 billion is realized through use of child models in films and magazines, the report said.

Town school at maximum

STOUFFVILLE — With four portables now in use, Summitview School's still "bursting at the seams."

To alleviate further problems, a recommendation is being placed before the Board, asking that elementary school-aged students, moving into the Dulyerton and Revenue Properties subdivisions, be bused to Orchard Park.

If approved, the decision will include new families moving into the rural area north of Stouffville, between the Ninth Line and the Durham Regional boundary.

All students now residing in these areas, may remain at Summitview until graduation or transfer to Orchard Park.

Summitview principal Lorne Boudway anticipates approval of the request. It's fortunate, he said, that Orchard Park has the space; otherwise it might be necessary to bus students to Whitchurch-Highlands or Dickson's Hill.
