

Peewees take revenge at Cobourg tourney

After being edged by 5-4 by Cobourg in Friday night's league game, the Credit Union Peewees got their revenge by lifting the championship title at Cobourg's weekend tournament.

Two victories over teams from Oshawa and East Gwillimbury set the stage for yet another encounter with Cobourg.

The Clippers defeated Oshawa 5-1, Jason Underwood firing three of the markers, with singles going to Anand Date and Todd Balazs, assists by Guy Biadi (2), Campbell (2), Rob Mountjoy and Brad Blacktapp.

East Gwillimbury fell

easily, a 6-2 win, led by Anand Date with a hat trick, captain Jason Underwood potting a pair and Dayle Lewis a single.

The championship game was everything that was expected. True to form, the Clippers fell behind 3-0 (a trait that keeps their fans on tenterhooks) before deciding they'd like to take the trophy home; even by their standards they'd left it a bit late in the day to start winning medals.

However, they dug deep and came up with a formulae hard work. They kept plugging away at the Cobourg defense until Keith Piette,

from Glover, finally found the net. A second inspired goal by skipper Underwood closed off the middle frame 3-2 to Cobourg.

Nine seconds into the third period, Greg Fredericks tied it up for the Clippers, followed by another quick goal just 20 seconds later. This

one from Guy Biadi, well placed in front of an open net, Campbell slipping in the assist and putting the Clippers ahead for the first time.

The final frame was a dandy. The Clippers picked up seven minor penalties and were short-handed throughout, but their penalty-killing was

spectacular. Underwood's unassisted goal gave them breathing space, and just to prove that the impossible can be done, Date scored with the Clippers two men short.

It was a finish in keeping with the come-from-behind reputation the Clippers have built.
