

# 'FAME' CLIPPERS QUALIFY FOR SILVER STICKS

The Fame International Atom Clippers were successful in their efforts to obtain a berth in the Silver Sticks tournament, to be played at Sarnia on Dec. 27. Travelling to Wasaga Beach last weekend, the Clippers showed their paces by winning both their preliminary games and amassing a total of 22.5 points; the highest

in the tourney. Points were awarded on the basis of 3 points for winning a period, three points for winning the game, plus three points for a shutout; making it possible to earn a maximum of 15 points. In their opening game against Caledon, the Clippers failed to score in the first period but

came back with a four goal salvo in the middle frame. Nathan Brown opened with an unassisted effort, followed by Marcus Milos and Brandon Pridham (from Jay Scaife) to make it 3-0. Goal of the game came from the Caramanico-Whitebread combination. Caramanico took the puck end-to-end be-

fore making the perfect pass to Whitebread, who promptly found the net to make it 4-0. Caledon made a solitary reply just before the period ended. Pridham scored again in the third period, a very nice play by Whitebread and Scaife. However, Caledon managed to get on the board and spoil the Clippers re-

cord, reducing their points total to 7.5. Caramanico received a medal as the games' MVP, while Jeff Willis was outstanding in the Clipper net. Against Ennismore the Clippers could do no wrong. They were unbeatable. Turning in a perfect score of 15 points they hammered in eight goals with no reply from

their opponents. A five-goal first period saw markers from Jason Whitebread, on a great play by Caramanico who also scored the second one unassisted; Caramanico added two more markers, one from Paul Trentadue the other unassisted. Darin Zeller was responsible for goal number three. Whitebread com-

pleted his hat trick in the middle frame, giving the Clippers the necessary goal to win the period and collect three more points. Third period goals came from Darin Zeller, from Pridham, and Jay Scaife from Whitebread. Caramanico wound up the tournament by receiving his second MVP award of the day.

The Intermediate Clippers came from behind, a long way behind, to win 11-8 against the Pickering Rangers in Saturday night's game at Stouffville arena.

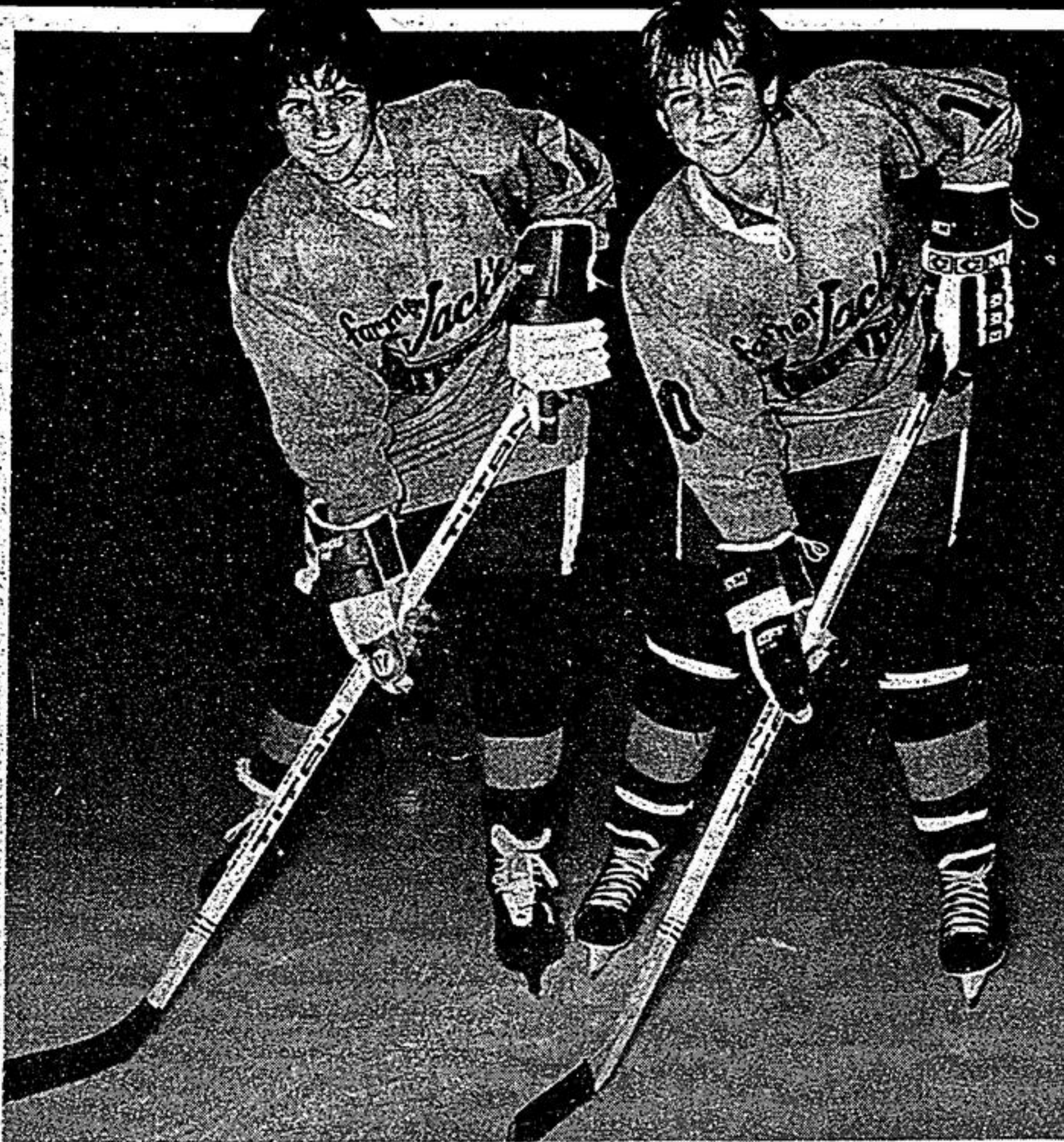
