Labor of love

VANDORF — For more than a month, members of the Vandorf Women's Institute have been hard at work, completing a quilt at the Whitchurch-Stouffville Museum.

But this is no ordinary quilt. It tells the story of "A Journey Into Yesteryear", a bicentennial project depicting a 500-mile cross-country trip by horseback, bicycle, carriage, canoe and on foot.

The journey was organized by the Ontario Trail Riders Association and took one month to complete.

The quilt, measuring 100" x 100", contains 81 blocks. These blocks recognize the names of communities and pioneer families along the route.

The Vandorf W.I., renowned for members with quilting skills, began piecing the blocks together, Jan. 16. On Feb. 11, the quilt was put in

a frame and on Feb. 21, it was completed.

It will be placed on display at Quarterama '85 in The Coliseum, Exhibition Park.

It was Mavis McCallum of Cherry Street, R.R. 3, Stouffville, who contacted Miriam Duckett of Lemonville, concerning the quilting project.

Mrs. Duckett approached the Vandorf W.I., and members willingly agreed. "We usually do one quilt a year," Mrs. Petch told The Tribune. "The completed project will be displayed at various locations along the journey route, then serve as a wall hanging at Scotsdale Farm where the journey concluded."

TAKE NOTICE THAT the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville on the 12th day of February, 1985 passed a motion of Intention to designate the property, including lands and buildings, known municipally as Sander's Block, 29-33 Main Street West, Lot 10, Plan 70, Stouffville, as a property of architectural and/or historic interest or value under Part IV of The Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980, Chapter 337. Short Statement of the reasons for the proposed designation:

The Sander's Block, located at 29-33 Main Street West, Stouffville, is deserving of designation and renovation for historical and architectural reasons. The original structure was built in 1877 at the time of the incorporation of the Village of Stouffville. Its original owner and builder, Mr. William B. Sanders, made a significant contribution to the early commercial and political development of Stouffville. The additions to the original structure, which were completed in the 1890s, provided the elegant facade as it appears today. The building's location on the sunny side of the street and its imposing front entrance and roof tower, make it the most important historic commercial building on the Main Street of Stouffville. It is one of the oldest and last remaining architecturally significant two storey commercial brick buildings in the centre of the Old Village of Stouffville.
