Spartan cagers top team at Woodbridge meet

Competition was tough at Woodbridge High School's Wyvern Invitational basketball tournament, but it didn't stop the senior Spartan cagers from collecting the championship trophy.

The Spartans dropped only one game, against Langstaff in the opener, before making a comeback and beating them in the final - albeit by a single point.

For coach Dave Connell and his boys, the win was a complete turnaround after a poor start. The series allowed the teams only a

single loss before elimination. "We played very poorly in the first game, missing lay-ups and easy jumpers which hurt us badly," said Connell. "However, prior to game two, coach Connell's pep talk obviously had an effect, they comfortably disposed of Richmond Hill 70-57."

Mark Morrow set a hot pace with 31 points, strongly supported by Mark Savary with 16. Dave Elliott and Bernie Schopf were both 8 pointers.

Against Brebeuf in the

semis, which they won 65-60,

Savary came into his own with 21 points, followed by Morrow with 18. Schopf, consistent throughout the series, added 8 of his own with Gary McGilvray also tallying 8.

Ironically, it was Lang staff who faced the Spartans in the final. In a highly exciting game that saw several changes of lead, the Spartans squeaked by to avenge their previous loss 51-50.

Throughout the tourney, Garnish Persaud, who seldom shows up among the

scoring leaders, displayed fine handling and a defensive fervour that verged on the fanatical. Coach Connell was well pleased with his boys. "It was gratifying both to myself and the team to end the season on such a positive note," he said.
