This enabled the water to flow free. The road men were out until 10 p.m. Saturday, Mr Gibson said, and back on the job Sunday morning at eight.
 A flooding problem occurred on the Ninth Line. This was eventually corrected by the Region since this section comes under their jurisdiction, Gibson explained. Despite the severity of the winter, including ice, snow and rain, the Town's road budget will remain in the black, the superintendent said.

**** A NEW CONCEPT FOR HIGHWAY 401 ****

The Ontario Ministry of Transportation and Communications has embarked on a program to install Freeway Traffic Management Systems in major urban areas such as Metropolitan Toronto, Mississauga, Oakville, Burlington, Hamilton and Ottawa.

Freeway Traffic Management is a concept for managing the traffic flow on urban freeways to improve the safety, level of service and efficiency under varying roadway and traffic conditions.

The first phase of the Highway 401 Freeway Traffic Management System will become operational in the late 1980's. It will extend from Highway 427 to Highway 404/Don Valley Parkway.

Markham disqualified

A poor showing at the Georgian Bay, finals means Markham District High School's ski team won't be making the trip to the Ontario high school championships.
 The four-member girls' squad was disqualified because official times from three members of each team must be recorded, and Markham came up with only two.
 Two weeks ago it was the girls who carried the school to the York Region championship over Thornhill Secondary School. But it will be Thornhill, not Markham, that competes at the provincials.
 Out of about 50 skiers, Laura Stone managed to earn a sixth-place finish and Kathy Shore a seventh. Erin Legge fell on her run, and Marni Anderson was disqualified for losing both her poles.

"I'm disappointed for them because they could have gone to the Ontario championships," said coach Ed Winacott. "And on a good day they would have qualified. But ski racing is like that; you only have to fall once and you're out of it."
 The disqualification is the first for Markham in its three years of competition.
 The Boys' team fared somewhat better with a fourth-place finish out of 12 competing teams - only one place behind its York Region finish.
 Henry Shannon was 15th and Sean Lowe 23rd, while Paul Shore was disqualified. "My hopes were with the girls; but on a good day the boys could have pulled it off as well," said Winacott. "But it was a bad day."
