The ingredients follow: A six quart basket of tomatoes; 4c. finely cut onions; 6c. finely cut celery; 1/2c. salt; peel and cut tomatoes; combine with celery and onions; sprinkle with salt; let stand over night and drain, (very well) in morning; add 5c. white sugar; 2c. cider vinegar; 1/2 teaspoon cayenne pepper; one or two red peppers and two green peppers; one ounce of mustard seed. Combine thoroughly until sugar is dissolved. Boil slowly uncovered for 15 minutes. Makes about seven pints. So there you are ladies, the recipe for the best dog-gone chili sauce I've ever tasted.
