Life begins at ninety

Program aids cancer recovery

STOUFFVILLE — Cancer is a life-threatening disease. A positive medical report is a traumatic experience. Many find it difficult to cope.

An organization that helps bridge the gap between identifying the problem and hopeful recovery is called 'CanSurmount'. CanSurmount is a volunteer program that had its beginning in Denver, Colorado, in 1979 and now is established in Canada. A branch was started in York Region last year. Dr. Bill Murphy of Stouffville is a regional co-ordinator and one of sixteen volunteers. He spoke at a meeting of Cancer Society captains and canvassers in Stouffville, United Church, May 8.

CanSurmount is a one-to-one visitation program between volunteers whose lives have been touched by cancer, and patients currently fighting the disease.

"The position of having been there, prepares them to share the patients' deep feelings that even the most understanding friends and family may be unable to realize."

Dr. Murphy describes it as "an emotional support program."

"The speaker is one who's been there. His medical problem, four years ago, was diagnosed as cancer. However, at that time, there was no organization like CanSurmount in the area."

"It all happened so fast, (the diagnosis and the surgery), I didn't have much time to think about it," he said. Feelings of deep depression occurred later, he explained. He said his wife proved tremendous support.

Dr. Murphy recalled wondering if each important event, (an anniversary, a birthday and Christmas), would be his last. He said other concerns, that previously seemed important, suddenly became trivial.

Dr. Murphy said 50 percent of those persons in attendance at Wednesday's meeting would be effected, either directly or indirectly, by cancer.

CanSurmount, he said, is a visitation program that can occur in a hospital or in the home. The identity of patients is confidential, he said.

Membership in the organization is growing, he stated. The contact number locally is 640-2702.
