Twinney raps pay raise

YORK REGION — York Regional councilors have voted themselves a five per cent raise, effective Dec. 1.


Acting on a motion by Ron Moran of Markham, members agreed 10-3 to boost their own salaries from \$15,805 to \$16,595 and the chairman's salary from \$61,736 to \$64,823. Each is one-third tax free.

Leading the opposition was Aurora Mayor Dick Illingworth. He flatly stated that Regional Council was "overpaid."

"The cost of living has risen only 3.8 per cent," Mayor Illingworth said emphatically. "The pay was \$6,000 a year when I started back in 1971 and it has more than doubled. For the work we do here at Regional Council, we're overpaid."

Mayor Illingworth called for a recorded vote. He gained support from only Georgina Mayor John Rogers and Vaughan Councillor Jim Davidson.
