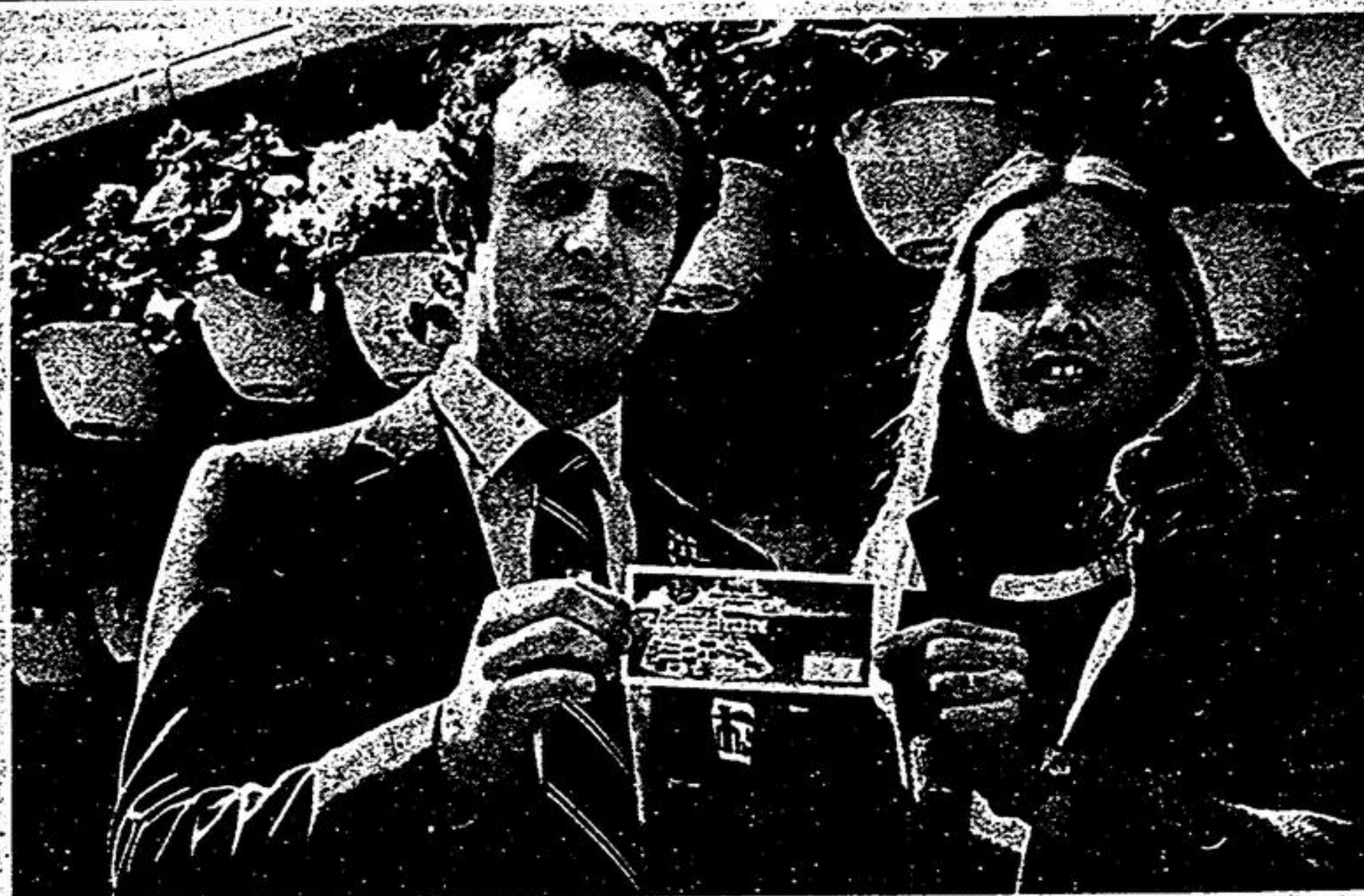
Residents of the village are soon to receive a questionnaire asking what
