Audio repair shop opens in Markham

A shortage of qualified audio repairmen has led Lawrence Lee to locate in Markham. Until April, Lawrence Lee, manager of Reliable Audio and Video Repairs on Laidlaw Blvd., ran a service shop in Downsview in co-operation with Stereoland. When Stereoland moved, Mr. Lee realized there was a shortage of qualified audio/video repairmen in Markham, so he opened shop here.

The company specializes in warranty repairs for video machines and audio equipment such as stereos, tape decks, turntables and televisions. They will service such makes as Panasonic, Quasar, Technics and Yamaha. Soon they will be licensed to repair equipment from the Nippon Electric Company.

"It doesn't matter where you purchase your equipment, just bring in the bill of sale and the warranty and we will repair it," said Mr. Lee. Reliable will then bill the manufacturer for the cost of repair.

The servicing is not only limited to warranty repairs for

these specific makes. Any audio and video equipment can be brought in for repairs and free estimates. Mr. Lee will also try to obtain parts for the do-it-yourselfers.

Proposed Official Plan Amendment

8911 Woodbine Avenue, Markham, Ontario.

A Public Meeting will be held by the Planning Committee of the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Markham to consider a proposed Official Plan Amendment under Sections 17 and 21 of the Planning Act 1983.

The subject property, shown shaded on the map below, consists of Part of Lots 1 to 5 inclusive, Concession 6 and Part of Lots 1 to 6 inclusive, Concession 7. The proposed Official Plan Amendment would amend the provisions of Official Plan Amendment No. 30 (The Armadale Secondary Plan) by increasing the maximum permitted density from 13.6 units per hectare to 15.5 units per hectare for the lands as shown shaded on the map below.

The effect of this amendment would be to increase the total permitted number of dwelling units by 717 units, and a corresponding population increase of 2438 persons.

The purpose of this meeting is to ensure that adequate information is made available to the public and to afford any person the opportunity to make representations in respect of the proposed Official Plan Amendment. If you are unable to attend the meeting, your representation can be filed in writing either by mail or personal delivery to reach the office of the Planning Director not later than July 16, 1985.

The proposed Official Plan Amendment and additional information relating thereto are available for inspection in the Planning Department, second floor, 8911 Woodbine Avenue between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., Monday to Friday, or further information may be obtained by telephoning the Planning Department at 477-7000, extension 224 during the same hours.

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Lynx-Ziyad make deal

Ziyad and Lynx Technology of Markham have announced the introduction of the PaperJet 2000, a printstation combining a daisy wheel printer, two trays for sheet-feeding, an envelope feeder and an acoustic cover.

The PaperJet 2000 will be sold in Canada by Lynx at an end user price of \$6,995.

The PaperJet simplifies operator/machine interaction. It memorizes the name and address of correspondence, automatically positioning them on an envelope. Optimal paper paths reduce jams while a control panel determines and locates any error condition. It uses standard printwheels and ribbons.

The printstation is designed for a shared user environment. It will hold up to 350 sheets of paper as large as 12" wide by 14" long and 100 #10 envelopes.

Companies join forces

Black Box Corporation is the latest of the companies that Signatel has joined forces with to move into the Canadian market. Operating out of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, Black Box manufactures interfacing devices that make different computer terminals compatible.

Since the agreement was signed, Signatel has moved into manufacturing the Black Box in Canada. Mr. Kulik noted the agreement will create employment opportunities for technicians, sales, clerical and manufacturing personnel in the future.

Signatel is also the sole Canadian distributor for Trend, an English computer company that has had a great deal of success with its Trend Display Telex Terminal, and Microm Systems of the United States that specialize in devices that set up and improve the quality of communication between computers and terminals.

Mr. Kulik says he's pleased with the progress the company has made and thinks Signatel has the potential to become a \$10 to \$12 million company by the end of the decade. He said part of the reason for his optimism is the development of a hardware and software packages catalogue for the personal computer that will be available in October.

TAKE NOTICE THAT the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Markham on the 14th day of May 1985 passed a motion of intention to designate the property, including lands and building, known municipally as being the Henry Wilson House located at 144 Main Street North, Markham, Part of Lot 12, Concession 7, Markham, as a property of architectural and/or historic interest or value under Part IV of the Ontario Heritage Act, R.S.O. 1980, Chapter 337.

Short Statement of the Reasons for the Proposed Designation:

The Henry Wilson House is an excellent example of High Victorian architecture and the foremost intact example of this architectural style within the Town of Markham. Of special note are the L-shaped verandah with ornate architrave and carved brackets, the windows with multi-coloured, stained glass transoms and the decorative wood turnings, fretwork and appliques of the projecting bay gables.

The house was built in 1888 for Henry Wilson, a well-established general merchant in the Village of Markham, and sold to Dr. John MacDonald in 1917. The house remained in the MacDonald family until 1983 and served as a home and medical offices for Dr. MacDonald and later his daughter, Dr. Innis MacDonald. Dr. Innis MacDonald was one of the first women in Canada to earn her medical degree and was also a noted Canadian eye specialist.

NOTICE OF OBJECTION to the designation may be served on the Clerk within thirty (30) days of the 29th day of May, 1985.
