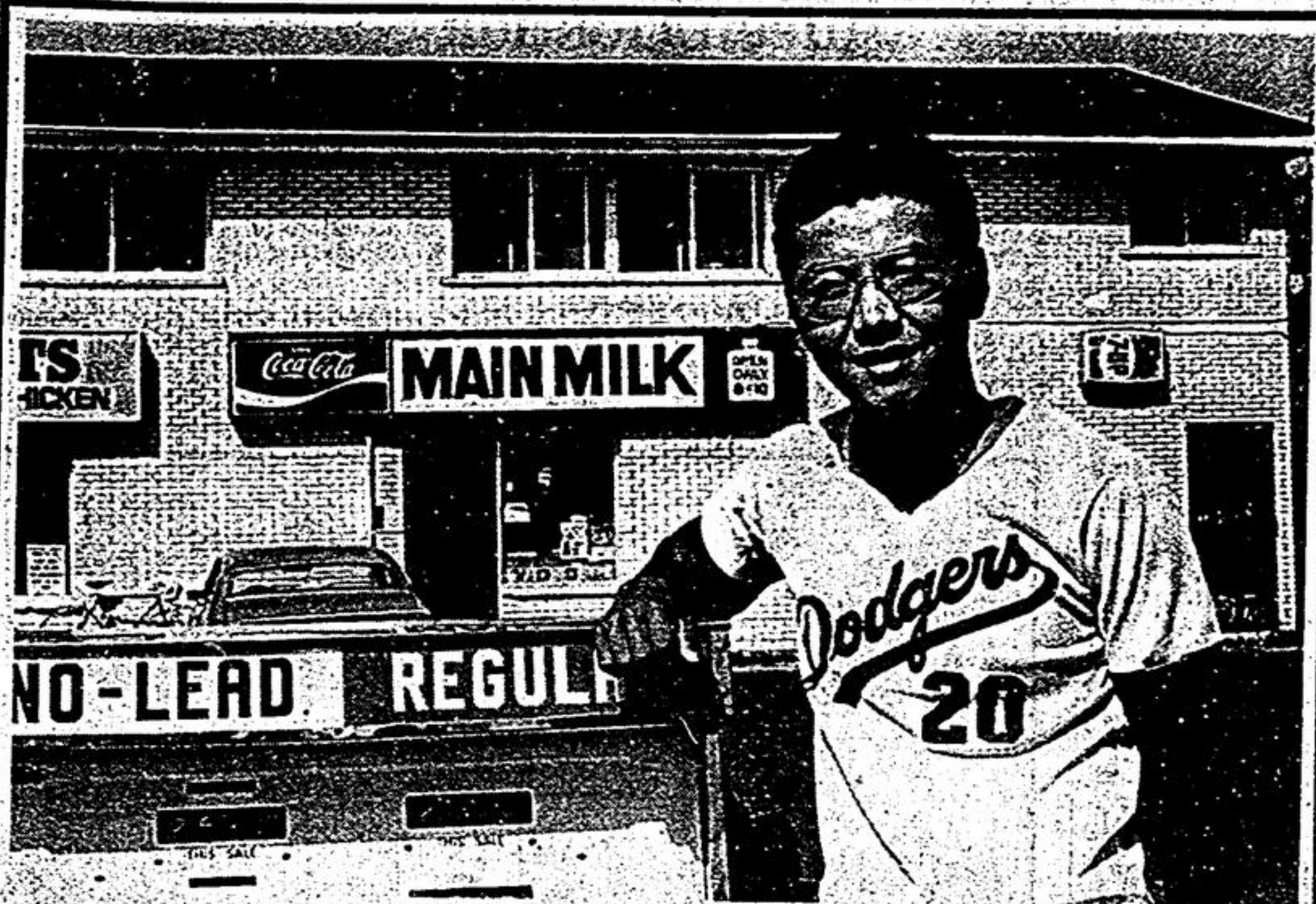


Harold Kim — top graduate at U.S.S. Plans medical career



Harold Kim is this year's top graduating student at Uxbridge Secondary School. The native of Korea has returned to his homeland this month to participate in a government-sponsored educational program. UXBRIDGE — The notion of prolonging human life through heart surgery appeals to Uxbridge, Secondary School's top Grade 13 graduate, Harold Kim, 18, headed the school's list of eight Ontario Scholars with a six-subject average of 93.7 per cent.

His individual marks are: functions and relations, 97%; algebra, 95%; calculus, 94%; history, 93%; biology, 92%; and physics, 91%.

Harold, the son of Hung Sik and Wee Suk Kim, Main Street, Uxbridge, plans to work toward a career in the medical profession, most likely as a heart surgeon.

He'll enter the University of Western Ontario's general sciences program this fall on a \$1,000-a-year academic scholarship. After two years, he plans to attend medical school, for another four before training as a surgeon.

"The excitement of it appeals to me," Harold says of the career he's been contemplating since his early teens. "The thought of prolonging life intrigues me."

Harold's individual accomplishments are by no means limited to academic excellence.

Sports was also a big part of the student's high school career. He was named the top male volleyball at U.S.S. this year and was also a standout at basketball and badminton.

The Uxbridge resident may continue with athletics during his post-secondary education, all depending on the academic workload.

Harold will receive a number of awards at the high school's fall commencement exercises, including individual honors in history, mathematics and science. He's also been nominated for the coveted Trinity Cup, an award going to the individual selected by staff and senior students for his outstanding qualities of character, leadership, scholarship, and for athletic ability.

His fond memories of U.S.S. include the "fun" physics classes of Al McConney, the school's retiring science department head. Another highlight was a chilly January trip to an Edmonton basketball classic as a member of the senior Tigers.

Harold left Uxbridge during his Grade 12 year to attend Grenville Christian College at Brockville. This change of environment, he says, provided an opportunity to meet "new people from all over the world."

Harold's departed for a two-week trip to his native Korea, where he's participating in a government-sponsored educational program.

He was especially excited about this journey because it's his first trip home since he came to Canada with his family at age three.

The Kims, who run Uxbridge's Main Milk convenience store and gas bar, arrived here in 1975. They'd previously lived in parts of Toronto and for a year at London, Ont.

Following his stay in Korea, Harold will visit friends and relatives in Hong Kong for another two weeks, before returning to complete the summer working at the family store.

Ball diamond visitors 'park at their own risk'

UXBRIDGE TWP. — The unsightly appearance of the Scott landfill site has again drawn concern from members of Uxbridge Twp. Council.

Problems, including the haulage of unsafe loads on roads leading to the dump, were discussed at a meeting, Thursday.

The Township decided to send a letter to the Durham Regional Police force, requesting increased patrols in the vicinity.

Uxbridge's works department will inquire about the cost of two signs, which will specify the amount of fines imposed for improper dumping.

The landfill site, located on Conc. 6 near Leaskdale, is open Mondays and Saturdays.

Signs will be erected at Uxpark alerting motorists that they 'park at their own risk' on the site.

There have been numerous complaints about vehicle windshields being smashed by balls originating from the park's baseball diamonds, Ward 5 Councillor Ian Morrison said during a works and roads committee meeting, Thursday.

He suggested the markers be installed as a precautionary measure.

Ron Johnson noted that he has first-hand knowledge of this situation. The Ward 3 councillor had a ball smash his car windshield at the park last summer.
