Man placed on probation

UXBRIDGE — A 31-year-old Uxbridge man has been placed on two years probation for striking another man in the face with a chunk of ice last winter.

Paul Henry Robinson received a suspended sentence on a charge of assault with a weapon in Whitby district court July 24. Another related charge, that of assault causing bodily harm, was withdrawn.

He did not receive a two-month jail term, or any term of imprisonment, as reported in the Aug. 7 edition of The Tribune. The newspaper regrets any embarrassment caused to the Robinson family by this error.

Robinson became involved in an argument with two other men over a drink that was spilled in Evelyn's Restaurant on Feb. 16, court was told.

Later, 19-year-old Wesley Jackson of Centre Road North, Uxbridge, was struck in the face by a piece of ice thrown by Robinson.

Judge J.A. Hoolihan ordered Robinson to pay the victim restitution of \$1,000, to be made in monthly installments. The Plank Street man must also abstain from alcohol and maintain his association with Alcoholics Anonymous.

His mother, Verlyn Robinson, told The Tribune her son "feels very badly" about the incident. She also claimed Paul had himself been beaten by two restaurant patrons just before he tossed the ice.

"The Jackson boy (Wesley) was in the wrong place at the wrong time, and he got hit," Mrs. Robinson says.

Criminal negligence

To set date for accident trial

GOODWOOD — A 24-year-old Goodwood man is out on bail pending a trial on charges including criminal negligence causing death.

A trial date for William Latour is to be set in assignment court on Sept. 11. The suspect had earlier been committed to pre-trial in Whitby district court during a preliminary hearing in provincial court.

Latour was granted bail following a July 5 review, according to a spokesperson at the Crown Attorney's office, Whitby.

Florence Ingram was pronounced dead at Uxbridge Cottage Hospital on April 1, after her vehicle collided with another car at the intersection of Durham Region Road 21 and Conc. 3, Uxbridge Township.

Ingram was a long-time Claremont-area resident before moving to Whitchurch-Stouffville shortly before her death.

Latour also faces charges of impaired driving and driving with more than the legal amount of alcohol in his system.
