### Markham Fair's tractor pull

## Featured event attracts crowds

MARKHAM — In recent years, the tractor pull has been one of Markham Fair's biggest draws. And 1985 appears to be no exception as thousands of fans are anxiously awaiting this exciting event.

It's scheduled to take place on the fair grounds track Friday, Oct. 4 at 7 p.m. Stouffville's Steve Grove, chairman of the tractor pull committee, says there's sure to be plenty of fierce competition as entrants battle for points on the Central Ontario Tractor Pullers' Association circuit.

He expects the pull will attract as many as 15 modified machines, plus another 30 to 40 stock tractors. Entries come primarily from within a 75-mile radius.

"One thing we really encourage is that local farmers come out," Grove says. "That's how it all started. And the crowds enjoy it a lot more when they know the names of the pullers."

Nine classes Markham's nine classes are as follows:

5,200 lbs. modified tractors; 6,000 lbs. modified; 5,500 lbs. modified two-wheel drive trucks; 5,800 lbs. modified two-wheel drive trucks; 5,500 lbs. pro stock; 15,000 lbs. pro stock; 7,500 lbs. farm stock; 10,000 lbs. farm stock; and 12,500 lbs. farm stock.

Local favorites include Locust Hill's Don White and his Sodbuster modified tractor.

#### New pull

A new event at the fair this year is an A.T.V. pull, to be held on Wednesday, Oct. 2. It'll begin at 7:30 p.m. in the main building's livestock ring.

Grove is anticipating 30 to 40 competitors at this event, which he says will be run like the tractor pull but on a smaller scale.

"We're encouraging anyone who owns an all-terrain vehicle to come out and compete," he says. Participants can contact Steve Grove at 640-3718.

### Moto racer boosts speed

If motocross racers had a hard time catching Stouffville resident Todd Townend before, they're in trouble now.

The 14-year-old "Red Baron" of the 80 c.c. schoolboy circuit was recently approached by the Austrian manufacturer of the chic KTM dirt bikes to test ride a first-ever 80 c.c. model. Townend claims he's the first Canadian to be

given the opportunity.

The young National Champion took the European machine to "Bills Hills" near Wilberforce, Ontario on Sunday for a non-points race. He screamed to a first place finish, 90 seconds ahead of his second place opponent. Even more impressive, he lapped many of the slower riders.

"It's a really nice machine...the power band is really smooth and it has five more horsepower than my Kawasaki...and there was a big improvement on the straightaways too," exclaimed "Hot Toddy" (his track name).

With his nemesis Marty Burr jumping to the 125 c.c. class, Townend will

take over the number one ranking in Ontario for 80 c.c. riders. And the speed tycoon says he will most likely hold on to the expensive cycle for at least another year.

"Right now I'm the best rider in Canada...I'm going to try and stay in the 80 c.c. class next year so I can ride the KTM for a whole season," said the tenacious racer.

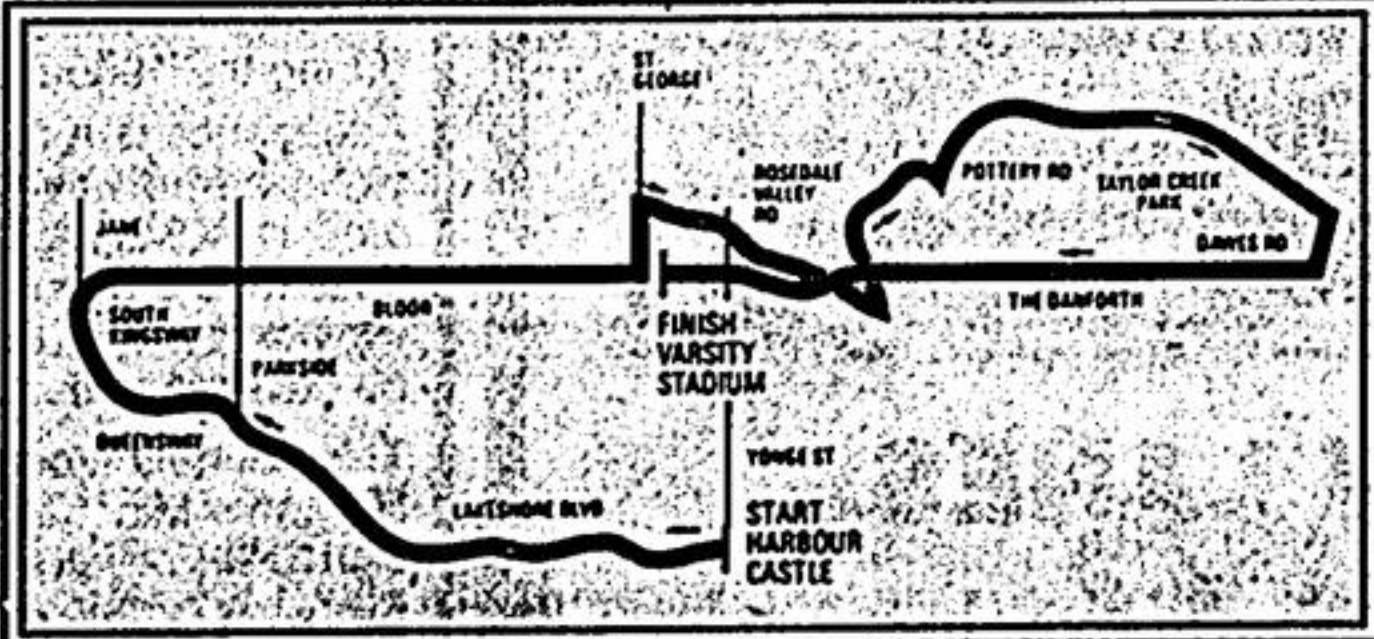
Townend ranked 10th in North America at the 1983 Tennessee Nationals and was the first Canadian across the finish line.
